YMCA Starts Electronic Class

A class in electronics for Jr. High School age boys will be offered by the St. Matthews YMCA starting Saturday, January 5. The class, which will feature the construction and operation of radio receivers and amplifiers, will meet each Saturday at 1 p.m. for eighteen weeks, and will be under the instruction of the Y's Men's Club who are sponsoring it. Jerry Goeth, of Dorsey Way, will be the instructor. Boys desiring to enroll may do so at the St. Matthews YMCA. The fee for the course is \$16, which covers the cost of all materials and parts.

The YMCA's winter semester of informal classes for adults will open on Wednesday, Jan. 16 and Thursday, Jan. 17. Nine classes will be offered with one lesson each week for eight weeks. YMCA membership is not required for enrollment, but a discount is given to those who are members. The schedule follows:

Will Lausman Installed As Y. Board Chairman

Will H. Lausman, 201 Fairfax Avenue, was installed as new chairman of the board of directors at the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. last week. He succeeds Clarence Hardin.

Other officers installed were: Willard Brown, vice president, succeeding Mr. Lausman; Harold Fleming, secretary, succeeding Mr. Brown; and J. Pryor Wise, treasurer, succeeding himself.

The officers were installed for one year.

Mr. Lausman, a native of St. Matthews, has been interested in youth organizations in the area for a number of years. He founded the first Boy Scout troop here over 30 years ago, which was sponsored by the old St. Matthews Community Club.

He became interested in the Y.M.C.A. about five years ago when the downtown organization held a capital fund drive, in which he participated. His work in that won him the distinction of raising the most money through individual effort.

At that time he also became interested in the St. Matthews branch. He has been chairman of the membership campaign for the past four years. Each year, he has carried the campaign over the top of its goal, bringing in 3,543 members and \$14,890 last year.

Mr. Lausman is the senior agent of the Provident Mutual Life Insurance Company, where he has been employed for the past 29 years.

He is a member of the Louisville, State, and National Associations of Underwriters and past president of the Louisville Association; treasurer of the Evangelical Hospital Association; member of the Board of Methodist Evangelical Association; an organizer and member of the Life Insurance and Trust Council of Louisville, and a member of Bethel Evangelical and Reformed Church.

He is married to the former Frieda Lang of Louisville and the father of four children, all married, and 16 times a grandfather.

Mayor James Noland this week proclaimed January 27 through February 2 as Y.M.C.A. Week in St. Matthews.

He urged citizens to join in "observing a period of commemoration to acknowledge the obligation to the volunteer lay leadership which has served and is serving the Y.M.C.A. here and all over the world."

He commented in the proclamation that the Y organizations in general "have become identified as the altruistic organized effort for the mental, spiritual, physical and social betterment of our youth."

On Sunday, a dozen or so St. Matthews Churches will observe "YMCA Sunday," using church bulletins from that occasion for their regular services.

On Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock, ministers and associate pastors of 12 St. Matthews Churches will be guests of the Y Board and staff at a Minister's Breakfast at the Y.

Also on Wednesday, the Y program will be the topic at the St. Matthews Rotary Club meeting.

The Y will be open all week for parent visitations to the Y Club and Gym Classes.

Other Y news:

The Winter semester of informal classes for adults at the Y has enrolled over 160 men and women in classes. The curriculum includes five classes in bridge, two in oil painting, two in square dancing, and one in ball room dancing.

The courses will last for eight weeks, with one lesson per week. Teaching are Mrs. Floyd Bohart, Square Dancing, and Mrs. Catherine Bohn, Ball Room Dancing.

The Women's Gym Class at the YMCA is one of its most popular activities. From 36 to 50 women attend each Monday and Thursday morning at 9 o'clock for the program of exercise and play.

The group is currently being led by Mrs. John Wells, of 4100 Allen Road, who is also active in YMCA Teen program, and on the Y Board of Managers.

Most of the ladies who attend the class, have children who also attend Y classes at other times, and are represented at such other YMCA program activities as the Indian Guides, Theater and Square Dance Clubs, Informal Classes, and Mixed Badmin'ion play.

Women and girls in the St. Matthews Y due to its Family Membership Policy, occupy an important place in its program.

The St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. board members and their wives honored former board chairman Clarence W. Hardin and Mrs. Hardin with a surprise banquet.

Mr. Hardin was presented with a gavel of walnut and gold. It was made by board member Lauren Guth.

The top part of the handle was made into the shape of a Y. A gold band around the head of the gavel was inscribed, "Clarence W. Hardin, chairman of the board, 1954-55-56."

Mr. Hardin was also given a life membership card and the officers' roster for those three years. These were encased in plastic. This present was also made by Mr. Guth. (See picture).

Mrs. Hardin was presented with a corsage of carnations. The ceremony was brief and informal. Mr. Guth made a few remarks.

However, the honor was a rare one. Only the late Burton W. Stevens had previously been honored by the St. Matthews Y, when a plaque in his honor was put up posthumously in the Y building last year.

Mr. Stevens was building chairman during the years the Y was planning, getting the money for, and constructing its building at Hubbards Lane and Norbourne Boulevard.

Mr. Hardin was chairman during the local Y's greatest years of expansion. When he took office, the Y had only an office over what is now Pendergrass Chevrolet. When he retired, the Y had its present quarter-million-dollar plant. Membership was tripled.

Y Theatre's 'Dear Ruth' A Hit

The newly-formed St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. Theatre seems to have a hit on its hands with its second production, "Dear Ruth."

This comedy, written by Norman Krassna in 1945 and widely performed since, could have laid an egg due to an overworked and somewhat stale plot. The fact that it didn't was due mainly to fine direction and spirited acting. It emerged as a sprightly bit of entertainment, and the audience was right in the mood.

The Y.M.C.A. group achieved its two-fold purpose of utilizing varied, and some untrained talent, while providing wholesome entertainment for a family audience. Bill Carroll deserves much credit for the timing, which was excellent, and for the enthusiasm of the performers.

The story of the play evolves from the actions of Miriam Wilkins (Leta Anderson), a precocious and irrepressible teenager. Miriam has the formidable talent of being able to foul up any given situation in any number of ways.

Leta Anderson bounced

through the play as though she was born for the part. Her natural exuberance coupled with the frightening intensity and belligerence of the adolescent was fascinating. She seemed to have poise beyond her years and her "drunk" scene was played with the control of a professional.

Chief among Miriam's victims is her older sister, Ruth (Bobbie Wright) who has just become engaged to a safe but stuffy man named Albert Kummer, played with dispatch by Fred Reed. On the eve of their engagement, a young Lieutenant (Don Wright) fresh from the wars, arrives and stakes out his claim for Ruth.

This claim is based on what he reveals is a lengthy and romantic correspondence. Her parents are slightly bewildered by this turn of events, but Ruth is even more so, as she has never heard of the guy. The truth will out, and Miriam reluctantly admits to the hot and heavy mail romance with the Lieutenant, in Ruth's name.

It seems that while president of "Bundles for America," an organization dedicated to knit-

ting for the boys overseas, she and her pals decided to include personal letters to keep up morale.

After the first flush of anger has died down, Ruth agrees to see the boy and from there the deception builds up to all sorts of complications. Albert is practically foaming at the mouth but her family is becoming increasingly fond of Bill, as is Ruth.

It is Miriam, naturally, who upsets the applecart which is already precariously balanced. She blurts out the truth and this both ruins and solves everything. By now Ruth is really in love with Bill. All ends well, amidst confusion; Ruth ditches Albert, marries Bill hastily and sets out on her honeymoon.

* * *

Lucille Wilder was effective as Mrs. Wilkins. Her asides to her husband and facial expressions were a scream.

Bud Froment played Ruth's father, frantically trying to keep order amidst chaos. He played his role to the hilt, by turns furious, indignant and sympathetic.

Don Wright made an effervescent Bill Seawright. The original eager beaver, he convinced everyone of his charm and determination.

His wife, Bobbie, made a very attractive Ruth. She played the part capably and was particularly effective when pacifying the various members of her family or her erstwhile fiancée when they are aggravated to the boiling point.

Mary Robinson did a good job as Dora, the maid. B. Max Byrd made a brief appearance as Harold Klobbarmeyer, another of Miriam's proteges.

Darlene Scheibel and John Nichols were fresh and able in their roles as Bill's sister, Martha, and his buddy, Chuck Vincent. Nichols seemed self-assured and should be someone to see more of.

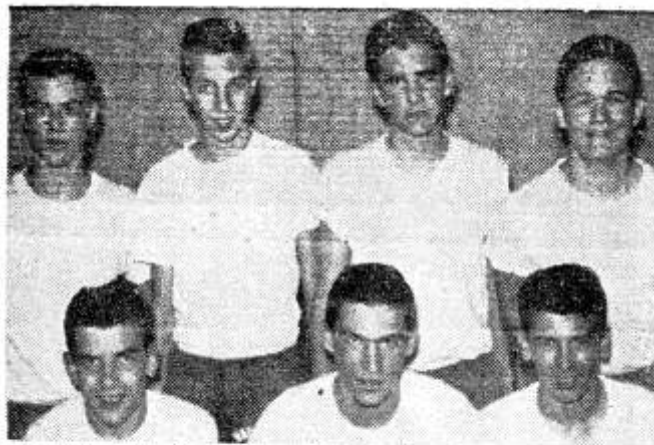

Ross Chasteen Resigns As St. Matthews Y Secretary Gets Higher Post In Mississippi

Ross Chasteen resigned yesterday as executive secretary of the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A.

The resignation will be effective about June 20, when Mr. Chasteen will leave for his new job as general secretary of the Y.M.C.A. and all its branches in Vicksburg, Miss.

He formally notified the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. Board of Managers of his decision at a board meeting yesterday evening.

Mr. Chasteen said the three years he'd spent at the St. Matthews Y have "certainly been the most productive and happiest three years of my life."

He came to the St. Matthews Y as executive secretary in February, 1954.

"The work I've done with the Y.M.C.A. Board and committees here in St. Matthews, and the response the Y membership and the St. Matthews community have given to our program, have been extremely pleasant and gratifying."

He said he was tempted to stay on in St. Matthews, but he's had the ambition to be a general secretary ever since he's been in Y work.

Besides, he said, life was so comfortable out here he was in danger of getting in a rut. That, he said, was fatal in a voluntary organization like the Y.M.C.A. Y work takes a lot of "hustle," he said. Y workers can't rest on their laurels. They must be constantly tackling new projects, and enlarging the scope of their organization's work, he said.

The Board of Managers has not yet announced his successor.

Since Mr. Chasteen has been here, the St. Matthews Y has moved into his building at Hubbards Lane and Norbourne Boulevard. Membership has gone up to about 4,000 from about 2,000. The annual budget, which was \$18,000 when he came, was up to \$40,000 last year.

Mr. Chasteen, 42, has been in Y work since 1942. A native of Rock Castle, Ky., he finished high school at Berea, and graduated in 1936 from Berea College with an AB in sociology.

He and his wife, the former Dorothy Stone of Pineville, live at 2430 Crosshill Rd. They have two children.

Mr. Chasteen is a deacon at Douglass Boulevard Christian Church, and belongs to the St. Matthews Rotary Club.

St. Matthews Y Physical Plant Now Accredited

The St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. now has an accredited physical educational plant.

The Southern Area and National Y.M.C.A. Physical Education Committee last week presented the local association with a Certificate of Eligibility, which officially recognizes the plant as meeting national standards.

The certificate makes the Y eligible for all intersession and championship events sponsored by the National Y., such as the Tennessee-Kentucky Sports Festival and the Southern Area Sports Festival held annually.

Requirements for receiving the certificate were:

1. Recognition by the National Council as a member association.
2. Conducts programs of health, physical education, and recreation.
3. Has a responsible physical educational committee and lay leadership.
4. Has qualified professionally trained leadership for its program.
5. Has a written policy outlining work and organization in this field.

Members of the physical education committee at the Y are Harold Fleming, chairman, Hunter Look, Carl Kimmel, and Charles Tye, physical director.

Mr. Tye was hired by the Y last June to take charge of the men and boys' physical education program then in its infancy.

He is a 1955 graduate of the University of Kentucky, where he majored in physical education. He is 24.

Day Camp Is Summer Hallmark Here

The Y.M.C.A. Day Camp is a traditional hallmark of summertime in St. Matthews.

Every year, with the closing of school, the community expects to see youngsters from five to 12 years old playing on the 29 acres of wooded, hilly land at Massie Avenue and Cherrywood Road.

This year's camp co-director, Joe Baskin, a 23-year-old Baptist Seminary student, says there's no doubt as to what's the favorite camp pastime among the boys and girls. It's swimming. Twice a week they are taken to the Crescent Hill Pool, and that is one trip they're all willing to make.

After swimming, the boys like archery, the rifle range, and hiking. The girls like handicrafts, which have proved surprisingly popular this year.

And make what you will of it psychologically, dodge ball seems to be a great favorite. In this game, an air-filled ball, similar to a volley ball or basketball, is hurled at somebody else and woe be to him who is slow-footed in getting out of the way.

The ball can't hurt anyone seriously, of course, but it's bound to sting, judging from the slapping sound it makes when it hits somebody. No score is kept, which makes the game all physical and hence more fun for children.

Other than fun, Mr. Baskin thinks the camp's most important accomplishment is that it teaches children how to live with each other. It throws together children of varying backgrounds.

"Many of the children haven't been used to abiding by group decisions," he said. "That's because they're an only child, or perhaps for some other reason. In the camp, they learn that other children have rights, too, and these rights must be respected."

Counselor Monty Jordan agrees with Mr. Baskin. "Some of the boys are of pre-school age, and this is their first group experience," he said. "After two weeks there is a marked difference in their ability to work with the group. At first they are too individualistic simply because they don't understand the group concept."

"A boy like this has to learn he can't do what he wants when he wants. He has to do what the group wants, and he learns to respect the schedule which calls for ball-playing at a certain time and hiking at a certain time."

Summing it up, he said these boys "learned what it was not to have their own way all the time."

Another counselor, George Chatman, tells of the experience of a 10-year-old boy, son of a local doctor.

"The boy was shy and retiring. He had no initiative," he said. But the counsellors discovered he had a knack for craft work.

"First he made a bracelet," he said. "It was faulty. Then he made a lanyard. It was a good piece of work."

That gave the boy confidence. In group games, he began to come out of his "shell of timidity," says Mr. Chatman. "He developed a knack for sports and got along well with the group. He became very well-liked and he was elected captain of his group."

Mr. Chatman laughed. "Think what we could have done with him if we had more than two weeks."

Day camp of course, lasts only two weeks. The first two periods are about over, and the third period runs from July 8 to 19.

From 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., the children are at the Day Camp, playing and enjoying themselves under the supervision of Mr. Baskin, his wife (who is co-director) and eight other counsellors, all but two of whom are Baptist Seminary students and wives.

This goes on Monday through Friday for two weeks. Besides the pastimes mentioned, there is softball, croquet, horseshoes, and storytelling. (And of course, non-scheduled sports. On the day *The Voice* visited the camp, the boys on the range put down their air rifles and dug up the ground all around trying to capture a mole.)

On the first of the two Fridays comes camp-out night. The children and the counsellors cook their meals at the camp, and then sit around the camp fire and sing songs, do stunts and play games. They sleep at the camp — in pup tents, sleeping bags, out in the open — any way they want to. The next morning they get up and cook breakfast at the camp.

The parents are allowed to come and help pitch the tents. Mr. Baskin says the day camp can handle 150 children at once. Possibly because of the rainy weather, there are only about 100 at the second session, which ends July 5. Normally, twice as many boys as girls are in the Day Camp.

The Camp is open to the public. Children must be registered at the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. That can be done by mail. The price of \$14.50 includes daily lunch and a Day Camp T-shirt. The third period begins July 8 and the fourth period July 22.

To take care of school children of all ages

The St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. is expanding the club program this fall in the schools of the greater St. Matthews area.

Gene H. Miller has been added to the staff as Program Secretary to handle all club work. The YMCA Club Program consists of clubs for all age groups from graded school through high school.

The Gra-Y Club is for boys in the fourth through the sixth grades. The Junior Hi-Y is for boys in grades seven through nine, and the Hi-Y is for boys in grades 10 through 12.

The Junior Tri-Hi-Y is for girls in the seventh, eighth and ninth grades and the Tri-Hi-Y is for girls in the 10th through the 12th grades.

The main emphasis is the YMCA Club Program is to build Christian character. The purpose of this club program is to "create maintain and extend throughout the home, school, and community high standards of Christian character."

The program consists of many varied educational and informative activities. Some program time is given to vocational guidance, with appropriate speakers in several different fields speaking to the clubs.

The clubs also spend time on projects for their school and churches. It has been often stated that the YMCA Club Program is the breeding ground for the future leaders in the civic and service clubs of our communities.

Perhaps, the highlight of the program is the annual Kentucky Youth Assembly held each spring

YMCA drive starts for 3,680 members

More than 160 volunteer workers will hit the doorbell circuit starting Monday night as the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. tees off on its annual membership drive.

The drive, which will extend over two weeks, has a goal of 3,680 members, according to Will Lausman, chairman of the board of directors of the local Y.M.C.A. branch. This total of sign-ups during the drive is necessary if the branch is to meet its budget requirements for next year.

The miniature army of workers, under the direction of Willard Brown, will attempt to contact every home in the St. Matthews area before the drive ends on Nov. 25. However, memberships will be taken at the Y.M.C.A. office at 4311 Norbourne Boulevard or by telephone.

A kickoff banquet in the gym Monday night will get the drive underway officially. Charles H. Edwardsen will be the main speaker. Workers will receive cards and final instructions.

Then the doorbell ringing will begin.

Co-chairman of the drive is Henry Hardin, while Al Tollefsen, Ray Ogden, Nathan Everett and Jack Fritsch are division leaders. Workers will offer five classes of memberships. The family membership is \$15 a year; the single adult membership is \$10; the boy or girl membership is \$8; the sponsored membership is \$8, and the sustaining membership is \$25.

The St. Matthews Y.M.C.A., the only Jefferson County suburban branch with its own building, was organized in 1949 and the building

erected in 1954. Since then it has attempted to develop and present a program designed to meet the needs of every member of the more than 9,000 families living in the area it serves. A permanent three-man staff, headed by Charles Ploegsma, directs activities. Other staff members are Gene Miller, and Charley Tye.

The groups divide into tribes, take Indian names and undertake various projects that emphasize the ways and lore of the American Indian. At present there are 21 tribes in St. Matthews alone.

C. H. Edwardsen, duPont's industrial relations manager, exhorted the volunteers to get rid of "the negative approach."

He warned them against the methods of the little boy who came to his house and said, "You don't want to buy a magazine, do you?"

"If you use an approach like that, you've already given your customer the answer," he said.

He reminded them they had a great product to sell—the Y. M. C. A. "Don't hand them literature," he said. "You can't sell literature. But you can sell the thing that has become a part of you, this wonderful Y, the dancing lessons, the gym classes, the basketball games, children playing. Tell them a Y membership is an investment in our community. Tell them in October 8,600 people used our building."

"Let's not kid ourselves."

He said the Y.M.C.A., like a church, was only a building "until hearts and souls are in it."

A permanent three-man staff, headed by Charles Ploggenius, directs activities. Other staff members are Gene Miller and Charley Tye.

Programs and activities, ranging from gift wrapping to volleyball, are scheduled Monday through Saturday during the winter months. Separate gym classes for boys, girls, men and women are offered. The program for boys and girls is divided according to age—four different groups for boys, three for girls—with extra lessons following the physical exercises.

In addition to the gym activities, a variety of other programs are available. Adult and informal education classes are held four nights a week. Subjects taught include square and ball-

room dancing, bridge, oil painting and interior decorating. A new class in gift wrapping will start Monday, while a group in leather craft will begin Thursday.

This outline of activities doesn't include the Y.M.C.A.-sponsored Indian Guides, the father-son group that meets at the home of members every other Sunday. The Indian Guides are for boys six through nine and their fathers.

Y play enjoyable despite cold setting

A VOICE REVIEW

To appreciate a play fully, you need a lot of people in the audience around you. The warmth and company of people enjoying themselves makes your own judgment keener. A half-empty auditorium is chilling and detracts from the fun.

That is particularly true at the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. The Y Players give their shows in-the-round on the floor of the large gym and it is a very cold room indeed with its high roof, slick floor and tile brick walls. The actors' voices bounce off the hard surfaces and the echoes whistle around your head like bullets.

Despite these handicaps, the Thursday performance of "The Loud Red Patrick," first play of the season at the Y, was a pleasant evening. The play is not much, but the cast had a good time with it, and for amateurs mostly without experience, they did a neat, workmanlike job.

The story is about the Flannigan family, consisting of a bombastic, liberal father and four daughters, who make all major family decisions by a vote based on one point for each year of each person's age. The system suffers a breakdown when the father, who is determined that all his daughters go to college before they get married, is overruled by a solid vote against his wishes by all four daughters.

First, the father brings in a drunken friend, Mr. Finnegan, as a member of the family to vote on his side. But the girls counter by admitting the housekeeper, Mrs. Gallup, to the family council.

The father then asserts dictatorial powers and forbids his eldest daughter, Maggie, to marry a scion of the local gas company, which he hates anyway. But when the young man, Ralph Penrose, suddenly grows up and acts like a man, the father backs down, and all ends happily.

The pace of the play on Thursday was, unfortunately, a little slow. It needed the sure hands of veteran performers to speed it up a bit, and here is where director William Carrell got some help, though not enough.

He had Betty Cartwright in the role of Mrs. Gallup and Kenny Rider played Mr. Finnegan. Both have had wide experience in comedy roles with the St. Matthews Community Theater, and whenever they came on stage, they picked up the play and swept it along at its proper pace.

One of the performers, Martha A. Vincent, who played Mary Flannigan, the second daughter, shows great promise. She is a very pretty, dark-haired girl who shows up well on stage, and presents a striking and poised appearance. She possibly would do very well in the title role of the Y's next play, "Sabrina Fair," although last week was her first time on stage.

Leon Perkins was a pleasant surprise as Ralph Penrose, the young man who suddenly grows up and claims his bride. It was his first show, too, but he did not seem to have even a touch of stage fright. Not that his performance was 100 per cent smooth. He needs plenty of polish. But he's not afraid to act and he's a handsome young man.

Chuck Edds played the father, Patrick Flannigan. Chuck made a valiant try, but he was miscast. He has no business playing a wooly-faced bombastic hard-head. He's more the debonaire Fred Astaire type.

Y.M.C.A. boys and girls on way to new record

The boys and girls of the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. are on their way to new record for World Service candy sales in Jefferson County. Last year they sold 254 cases of mints and candy drops. This year, already, it looks like they will sell 350 cases.

The drive closes March 7.

World Service is the Y.M.C.A. operation around the world in some 63 foreign countries. For instance, in Korea, the Y operates a boys' town that is completely self-supporting. Each boy receives schooling and learns a trade during his stay in boys' town.

The Y was the second group asked to come back to Korea after the Korean War. At the end of World War II, Gen. MacArthur asked them to come back to Japan first, with the World Service program. In Hawaii, the Y's have undertaken unique programs of nation building during summer vacation. Some 300 or 400 college students give their services along with the Y secretaries to go into remote jungle villages and completely rebuild the physical, cultural, and religious ways of life of natives, to build schools, churches, rebuild homes, and put in sanitary latrines and ditches. Agricultural majors go along and teach better methods of planting rice. Women are taught how to can and preserve foods. Children are taught organized games.

A town council is set up with a Mayor and aldermen. In general the change in a community represents the planning of a number of years, but concentrated or carried out in three brief months. The State Department has said that this nation building program of the Y is one of our strongest deterrents to Communism in Asia.

So when the boys and girls came by with their candy, do yourself and the world a favor. Buy some.

Y.M.C.A. leases camp site with swim pool

The St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. has leased for three years the 22 acres at Camp Kavanaugh for use as a senior day camp. On Massie Avenue will be used for pre-school children.

Outstanding feature of the new site is a 40-by-75-foot swimming pool. The present day camp site

The new camp will be run by Gene Miller, program secretary of the local Y. He said two fully-trained Red Cross aquatic directors will be on hand to give swim lessons.

Only children who have completed the first grade may attend the new day camp. Others must attend the junior camp on Massie.

Mrs. Diane Jordan, first grade teacher in the Jefferson County school system, will be in charge of the junior camp.

The site at Kavanaugh includes 22 wooded acres, four large log cabins with electricity and running water, a ball field, rifle range, archery range and hiking trails.

The Y is leasing three school buses to provide transportation. This bus will make stops along Westport Road, and in Lyndon, Middletown, Anchorage and Pewee Valley, to pick up the children each morning and bring them home at night.

Physical examinations will be given by the Camp doctor. These will be free to Y members.

"The beautiful new swimming pool at Camp Kavanaugh will mean that the day campers can swim each day instead of twice a week as in the past," said Mr. Miller. "Swim lessons will be given to beginners and intermediates."

The camp will be used in winter for weekend events, such as Indian Guide meetings, campouts, and for club events.

The total cost of the senior day camp at Kavanaugh will be \$20 per session. Each session will run for two weeks, with the camp opening June 9 and closing Aug. 1.

The junior day camp on Massie Avenue for pre-school age children will be operated on an elementary basis. There will be no swimming offered in this program. However, emphasis will be placed on educational games and studies of such subjects as nature, crafts, and other related subjects.

The total cost for the junior day camp on Massie Avenue will be \$12 per session. Each session will run for two weeks beginning June 9 and closing Aug. 1.

Registrations are now being accepted at the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. Enrollment will be limited and those who sign up early will be assured of attending one of the Day Camps this summer. A \$2 registration fee, which is not refundable, is required with each registration.

St. Matthews Y rated Superior

Study shows some weaknesses, mostly stemming from money lack, by Emil M. Aun

The St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. is superior to the average Y.M.C.A. throughout the country, a recent study distributed last week reveals.

The St. Matthews Y scored an average of about 3.5 points out of a possible 5.0, putting it right in the middle of the Y's throughout the country which have been evaluated.

Only the better Y's submit to evaluation, which is done only upon request.

The local Y was strong on five points—board of directors, program, financial policies, public relations and association relationships.

The Y was weak on five other points—membership, volunteer service, physical facilities, community relationships and number of professional personnel. Nearly all the weaknesses stemmed from a lack of funds.

The report issued after a standard test by the National Y, concluded that "The St. Matthews Branch is to be congratulated on the dedication and devoted attitude of the members of the self-appraisal committee. Clarence W. Hardin, Will H. Lausman, Thomas N. Pope, Albert Tollefsen, J. Pryor Wise, and the executive secretary, Charles L. Ploegsman, are keenly interested in the successful service of the Y.M.C.A. Their views and judgment reflected able leadership.

Mr. Lausman is chairman of the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. Board of Managers. Others mentioned in the report are on the executive committee.

The St. Matthews Y's strongest point was financial policies and business administration. In this category it scored a 4.23. Only a relatively low income kept it from being a perfect 5.0.

"The report noted that total income per registered constituent is low (\$8.20 while \$36 to \$50 is considered good). The report also indicated concern over inadequate reserve or budget for major repairs."

The Y's weakest point was community relationships. Part of this stemmed from the fact that the present building is used so much by the membership, that there isn't space enough for extensive use by outside groups.

But the biggest factor was that the Y tends to operate individually of other Christian, community and youth groups here. The report noted that the Y is not represented in the local Ministerial Association, and "is seldom a part of community planning."

The Y scored a relatively low 2.94 on physical facilities.

The report noted that "facilities are inadequate for the size membership" and "program equipment on hand is not adequate." It also noted that the three-year old building "has not expanded with the growth of membership."

Also in relation in physical facilities, the report notes: 1. The investment in facilities per member is low \$38 while \$134 and \$234 is considered good.

2. the cubic feet per member is low, 134 while 281 to 434 is considered good.

3. There is no space suitable for devotional or worship programs.

The report noted that the Y doesn't have enough full time professional help. It has one secretary and two assistants. A fourth man is needed.

The report also indicated that the Y's charge for members is too low. It said. "The membership committee should study the prevailing scale of dues charged for individual and family memberships. The study indicates low income per member."

The report on the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. is pretty clear. We've got a first class Y in St. Matthews, but it isn't big enough for this community. It needs more professional help and more facilities, which means more money. We're getting a terrific amount of mileage out of the present help, the present budget and the present facilities.

Y members ought to take pride in this report. It shows the Y is being used almost to the fullest possible extent and that nothing is being wasted. The plant, costing more than \$200,000, is being used so much by members that there isn't much space or time left for outside groups.

Five years ago, out here, the Y's program was meager and there wasn't any building at all. The Y was operating out of a small office and using the facilities of local schools and clubs. Today it stands firmly on its feet, right up there with the best in the country, ready to face the problem of expansion in this growing community.

Here's hoping the membership and the leadership is ready to face the challenge. Its greatest need at the moment is a swimming pool, and we feel sure that the Y will have one before long.

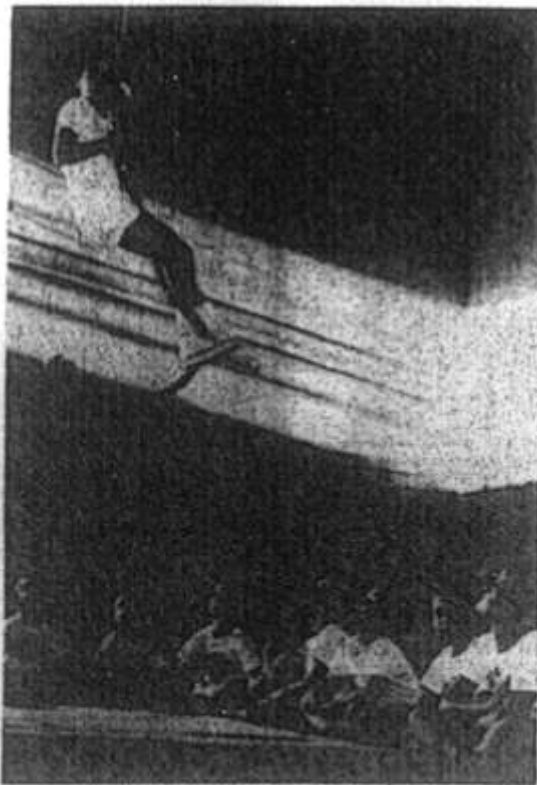

time in 13 years**

St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. opens summer program

One of the most comprehensive programs of summer activities in its history is now in session at the St. Matthews Y.M.C.A.

Programs being offered are baseball, basketball, gym classes, craft classes, educational trips, typing classes, golf classes, remedial reading, china painting, children's art, Junior Life Saving, girls' swimming lessons, and a day camp program.

Over 80 boys age 9 to 13 are participating in the baseball program which is designed to serve boys who need additional teaching and experience in the fundamentals of baseball. The boys are divided into four teams and meet three times a week. On Mondays the teams report one at a time for their teaching and coaching sessions and on Wednesdays and Saturdays they meet each other in a regularly scheduled league game.

These games and sessions are held on the St. Matthews YMCA baseball field, and are under the direction of Pat Crawford, assistant coach at Waggener High, and James Rayhab, YMCA physical director.

The basketball program is being run on three levels this summer, Junior High School, High School, and College. The Junior High league meets Thursday nights, High School, Tuesday nights, and College, Wednesday nights. There

are six teams with about 80 boys in each league.

Boys and girls ages 7 through 14 are offered instruction in gymnastics, tumbling, relays and games. The girls meet on Wednesday and Fridays, and the boys meet on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturdays. The classes are held in groups according to age.

Craft classes for boys and girls are offered each day from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, under the direction of William Hughes, shop teacher at Waggener High.

Each Friday morning a trip of interest and educational value is taken with the boys and girls in the program. Such places as the Louisville Bat Factory, Pepsi

Cola, Sealtest Dairy Co., Gordon's Potato Chip Co., Louisville Fire Department, and Ford Motors will be visited.

Over fifty boys and girls are taking part in beginners typing instruction, which runs for two weeks meeting five days a week for one and one half hours a day. Mrs. Clyde Hammack, who has taught in summer school typing classes here for four years, is the instructor. Another two weeks session for beginner and one for advanced will start June 29. Classes are held from 9 a.m. to 10:45 a.m. each day.

Golf is a very big part of the "Y"'s summer program. At present four classes are being offered, two adult beginners and one adult

advanced and one youth beginner. There are over 75 registered in these classes which are being held at the Golf course twice a week for four weeks. Joe Lally, Pro at Seneca Golf Course, is the instructor.

A class designed for boys and girls who need help in their reading and the progress of their reading level improved, is also being offered. These classes are offered on two levels, third and fourth grade levels and fifth and sixth grade level. Mrs. E. E. Gwaltney, well known instructor in the Louisville Education system and Public Library is the instructor of these classes which are being held at the new St. Matthews Library Building four times a week for six weeks.

The art of china painting is being taught by Irvin Hopkins, a national known artist in china painting. These classes offer the pupils not only the instruction but also the opportunity to create and design their own china and beautiful decorative pieces. Mr. Hopkins is also teaching classes in children's art, which helps the talented child to further explore his talents and improve upon them.

A class in Junior Life Saving is being held for boys age 11 through 14 years who are good swimmers and want to improve upon their skill and also train himself to be a protector around the water. These classes meet three times a week at the Downtown "Y" swimming pool and the course is seven weeks long.

Swimming lessons for girls ages

11 through 14 who do not know how to swim and those who want to better the little skill that they might have. These lessons are being held at the Crescent Hill Pool twice a week for one and one half hours each day.

The St. Matthews YMCA also operates two wonderful camps for boys and girls ages 4 through 13. The Kinder Kamp, for boys and girls 4, 5, and 6, is located on Cherrywood and Mastie Ave. The

program there will consist of nature study, crafts, hikes, adventure trips, movies and wading. Camp Kavanaugh at Crestwood, Ky., is for boys and girls 7 through 13. This camp offers all the aspects of resident camping only they do not spend their nights at camp. They receive swimming instruction along with crafts, hiking, archery, rifle, nature study, kickball, volleyball and badminton.

The Y.M.C.A. builds a \$205,000 building

The St. Matthews Y.M.C.A. has come a long way in 10 years. It has, in fact, made nearly all its progress since 1949, some say since 1955.

For it was in June, 1955, that the beautiful, modern building on Norbourne Boulevard near Hubbards Lane was completed and dedicated.

For a bit of history, a Y committee was first organized here in 1946, and a full-fledged branch was established in 1948, operating out of Greathouse School. By 1954, the family membership was up to 750, and construction was started.

Since the building has been finished, the Y has been a great social center, for children as well as adults.

The Y sponsors clubs for grade school and high school children, provides a gym and gym classes, and handicraft rooms. It offers classes in nearly everything for children and adults alike. It supports bowling and basketball leagues, and provides summer camps for children, including a Kinder Kamp for the first time this year.

Classes that have been taught in the Y's history or are being taught now include: gym, golf, typing, driving, bridge, square dancing, ball room dancing, painting, drawing, fencing, investment, electronics, interior decoration, gift wrapping, leather craft, ceramics, millinery, physical fitness, photography, charm, hula dancing, china painting, handicraft, typing, shorthand, modeling, practical law, public speaking, figure control, flower arranging, and children's art.

In addition the Y sponsors such activities as basketball, handicraft, teen clubs, Indian Guides, bowling, school Tri-Grays, Hi-Y, Tri-Hi-Y, Junior Hi-Y, Junior Tri-Hi-Y, Fun Clubs and playground, a theatre group, and two Day Camps and hopes to have a swimming pool before too long.

In 1956 the Y added a handicraft room with \$850 worth of tools being donated by the Lions, the Kiwanis, and the Rotary Clubs

of St. Matthews. Charles Ploegsma succeeded Ross Chasteen as Executive Secretary in 1957.

This years Y summer program is typical. The Y offers two camps, one for the four, five, and six year olds, and the other for ages seven through 13. Remedial reading, baseball, typing, and swimming are all offered. Each Friday morning boys and girls are taken to places of interest such as the Louisville Bat Factory, the Pepsi-Cola Company, Sealtest Dairy, Gordon Potato Chip Company, and others.

The St. Matthews Y has been recognized as one of the outstanding in the nation.

It was given a superior rating by the National Y Board in 1958. The strongest point was financial policy, and the weakest point was community relations.

The Y's building isn't adequate for its membership, there is no space suitable for devotion, and the investment in facilities is low. These points all counted against the Y, and all stemmed from a lack of money.

This means that if the Y is to be one of the best in the nation as it should be, it will require more money and more support on the part of the community. The Y has done a terrific job with the money it has had to work with. They have provided recreation and classes for the whole family. It is now up to the families to provide the Y with enough money to carry on an increased program.

St. Matthews Y sending 26 to Kentucky U.N.

The St. Matthews Branch of the Y.M.C.A. is sending 26 delegates and two peace proposals to the Kentucky United Nations Assembly, a model of the one in New York, which will be held at the Brown Hotel this weekend.

Not only that, three out of four state officers from District 1 (Jefferson County) are from the St. Matthews Branch. Jimmie Parrott is now a State vice president; Marcella Blakeslee, District 1 campaign manager; and Pat McGrath, chaplain.

The 26 delegates are from five Y-sponsored clubs: one Senior Hi-Y, (Grades 10, 11, and 12 for boys); one Senior Tri-Hi-Y (grades 10, 11, and 12 for girls); two Junior Tri-Hi-Y's (grades 7, 8, and 9); and one Junior Hi-Y.

Peace proposals at the UN are similar to bills in Congress. That is, they suggest a solution to a given problem, go through committees, and finally to the General Assembly. The General Assembly will consist of approximately 450 students from all over the state. The St. Matthews Y will make two of the 40 peace proposals: (1) Settlement of the Antarctica Territorial Claims, and (2) The Formosan Situation.

The Assembly, which opens today and closes at noon Saturday, will have as speakers two college presidents, and two members of the United Nations: Joseph Sisco of Washington, Dr. Irvine E. Lunger, president of Transylvania College, Dr. Thomas H. Spragens, President of Centre College, Robert R. Martin, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Joseph W. MacCabe, UN delegate from New York.
