President Harold Hammon said that all St. Matthews men interested in having their sons play in Little League next summer should attend the meeting. Other interested persons are also invited.

152 Sign Up For St. M. Little League

One hundred and fifty-two boys Saturday signed up for play in 1957 St. Matthews Little League, according to president Harold Hammon.

Those who failed to sign up Saturday may do so this coming Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the V.F.W. Hall, 113 N. Sherrin Ave.

There will be three leagues of four teams each this year. That will mean places for 180 players. In addition, 60 to 80 boys will have a chance to play in the minor leagues.

Marr Named League's Best Player Of '56

Bobby Marr has been named the Outstanding Player for 1956 of the St. Matthews Babe Ruth League.

The selection was made by the League's managers and coaches last week. Marr will be awarded a trophy at the annual Bull Pen Club banquet.

Marr, who was 13 during the summer, was a member of the pennant-winning Cub team.

He won the league batting title with an average of .406. As a pitcher, he was the league's strikeout king, with 52. He won five games and lost one, the second best record in the league.

In July, he hurled a no-hit game to lead the St. Matthews National All Stars to a 10-1 victory over Bowling Green in the State Babe Ruth League tournament.

There were eight teams of boys 13 to 15 years old in the 1956 St. Matthews Babe Ruth League.

Babe Ruth League Names Three New Managers

Three new managers in the St. Matthews Babe Ruth League have been named by league president Tom Smith as the league committee prepares for another season of junior baseball.

They are Don McKay, 4413 Lincoln Road, Jordan Home, 4209 Verbeuren, and Gilbert Armstrong, 3021 Grandview. McKay succeeds George Marr as manager of the Cubs and Boone succeeds Chester Rucker as manager of the Indians. Armstrong will manage the Tigers, replacing Bill Boehm, who moved from the area last year.

Returning managers are: G. F. (Bud) Tharp, 320 Browns Lane, Giants; Ken Deland, 3010 Kennison, Yankees; Pete Parice, 2529 Field, Dodgers; and Charles Sterner, 418 Deerfield, Red Sox.

The league also announced some important dates concerning last year's players and prospective candidates for the coming season.

April 12 — Community Center Field, 7 p.m., tryouts for all 14 and 15 year olds.

April 13 — Community Center Field, 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., tryouts for all 13 year olds.

April 19 — Community Center Field, 7 p.m., second tryout for 14 and 15 year olds.

April 20 — Community Center

Field, 3 p.m. to 5 p.m., second tryout for 13 year olds.

April 21 — Community Center Building, 10 a.m., auction.

June 1 — Tentative opening date.

Parents should have birth certificates of candidates who will try out for the League available. Birth certificates must be submitted at the time of registration.

Parents are urged to attend the General Meeting on April 5, so they can be informed of the League's objectives and what is expected of parents.

Little League To Sell Tickets For Barbershop Sing

Little League has struck up a bargain with the local chapter of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America.

The barbershop singers will perform in two shows at Memorial Auditorium May 11.

The St. Matthews and Algonquin Little League organizations will be in charge of ticket sales, said Harold Hammon, president of St. Matthews Little League.

After expenses are paid, all profits go to the leagues. The profits will be split on the basis of sales by each league. St. Matthews has three leagues, and Algonquin has one.

Ticket sales start next month. Prices have not yet been determined.

"This might well mean the end of financial difficulties for St. Matthews Little League," said Mr. Hammon.

The league has had to get by in the past on sponsors' fees and a great deal of volunteer help, he said.

He added that in 1957, there will be three major leagues in St. Matthews, with four teams to a league and 15 boys to a team. "If enough boys are left over, we will form a four-team minor league," he said.

Little League To Sell Tickets For Barbershop Show

The St. Matthews Little League, teaming up with the Algonquin Little League, is going out to make some money next month.

The two organizations will take over the ticket sales for the spring show of the Louisville Chapter of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America.

All proceeds from these two shows after expenses will be given to the Leagues, pro-rated according to the number of tickets each sells.

"This proposition offers St. Matthews Little League Baseball a once in a lifetime opportunity to acquire the necessary finances needed not only to carry out our present program for boys' baseball in this area but to expand it," said Harold Hammon, president of the St. Matthews Little League.

Up to this year, St. Matthews had two major leagues of 60 boys each, aged nine to 12, plus a minor league. This year, a third major league will be added.

Tickets will be on sale the first of April. Mr. Hammon called upon local business houses to buy blocs of tickets for their employees, so that "we will be able to reach our goal of baseball for all boys."

The show is slated for two performances on Saturday night, May 11, at Louisville Memorial Auditorium, with the first at 7:20 p.m. and the second at 9:30. For further information contact Mr. Hammon at TW. 5-5957.

Booster Day Is Slated For June 8

Booster Day on the St. Matthews Community Center grounds will be held Saturday, June 8, this year instead of in the late fall, Gene Wells, president of the Community Center, announced at an organizational meeting Monday night.

Cochairmen of the annual event to raise funds for operation of the Center will be Mayor James Noland, who has headed up the Booster Day program for several years, and Albert Sanders, who devoted much time to the event last year. Much of the ground work for Booster Day has already been done. That was revealed when Mr. Wells called for reports from chairmen of several committees working on the project.

Robert J. Clarke, Center treasurer working closely with Mr. Wells and Mr. Sanders, reported that the first event scheduled will be the annual Little League-Pony League March to sell tickets. The date has been tentatively set for May 14.

Seven new riders for children have already been booked for Booster Day, Mr. Sanders reported. He also obtained approval of an advertising program to attract a crowd to the grounds on Booster Day.

Hunter Look was appointed chairman of the booth committee, and received immediate applications from several clubs wanting to operate booths.

Robert Oliver reported that the county recreation department will again cooperate with the Center in supplying adult supervisors on the grounds throughout the summer. Center officials will interview and

select the supervisors.

Since the job wasn't completed last week, another clean-up day was scheduled for Saturday, with an appeal for volunteers to bring rakes, shovels, hoes, and axes.

Plans to enlarge the useable area of the Center grounds have been made, needing volunteers to help cut trees and brush to put the area in condition for recreational use.

Parents of boys between the ages of 13 and 15 who will be candidates for the Babe Ruth League Ball Teams, and parents of boys already in the League are urged to attend a meeting at Zachary Taylor Post, American Legion, 4848 Shelbyville Road, on Friday evening, April 5, at 8 p.m.

The officers and team managers will be present to explain the program for the 1957 season, and it is important for the parents to know what is expected of them in order that our program will be successful.

A preliminary registration will be held, and parents must submit birth certificates on all boys being registered, to comply with the rules of the national organization. Final registration will be held on Saturday, April 6, at the Community Center Building between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Job transfers will mean the loss of several people in the organization who have been very active in all the youth programs at the Community Center.

Allen Moyer, league players' agent, and Mrs. Helen Moyer, secretary, will move to Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

This will also deprive the league of a player candidate, Allen Moyer, Jr.

Ken Dillard will be unable to continue as a manager because of a change in his job responsibilities.

Mrs. Ann Ryan has been elected to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Moyer as secretary. Mrs. Ryan lives at 149 North Bayly, and has been a rabid fan at both Little League and Babe Ruth League games. Both Mr. and Mrs. Ryan have been active in some of the work projects conducted by the League.

The unexpired term as player agent will be filled by Albert Leibson of 2701 Grinstead Drive. Mr. Leibson also has been active in the programs at the Center.

A manager spot vacated by Ken Dillard will be filled by Bill Hill of 2102 Emerson Avenue. Bill is no stranger to the group, since he served in the capacity of the coach on last year's Indian team.

Babe Ruth League fans are in for a surprise when they see the work which has been done on the large diamond. League officials expressed appreciation for the volunteer help which has been coming out to assist not only on the work being done on the ball diamond, but also the clean-up work which is being done on the Community Center grounds.

There is still a lot of effort needed to get the grounds in the condition for Booster Day on June 8, but the accomplishments so far have been very gratifying.

The Babe Ruth League field managers, Dave McCandless, Lawrence Krueger, and John Gambill, have not only done an excellent job in supervising the work being done on the field, but have given a lot of physical effort in cleaning up the debris on the grounds.

Center Votes Down Softball On Playground

There will be no softball playing around the Community Center baseball diamond this summer.

The diamond will be used exclusively for hard-ball, according to Gene Wells, president of the Center.

The change was approved by the board of directors at a meeting Monday night at the Center.

The action was proposed by Mr. Wells in view of "the invitation by Zachary Taylor American Legion Post to players in the area to use their new, lighted softball field."

Since the new Legion field, which is across Shelbyville Road, is large enough only for softball, this will mean a possible increase in softball activity in the community, he added.

It will also aid in expanding the baseball program to include boys 16 through 18 in the newly formed American Legion Baseball League and will make maintenance of the field easier.

Maintaining a field for both baseball and softball purposes has proven highly impractical in the past, he said.

The board set June 8 as Booster Day for 1957.

The board also voted to adopt a program of expansion submitted by Bob Oliver, recreation committee chairman, for the forthcoming year.

Mr. Oliver, in his report, recommended:

Renovation and enlargement of the Tot Lot, with additional equipment added;

Painting the wading pool;
Setting up courts for croquet, badminton, volley ball, and paddle tennis;

Renovating the horseshoe pits;
Illuminating the above mentioned play areas;

Inviting all local groups to form teams and leagues for croquet, horseshoes, and volley ball;

Setting up a program of semi-monthly teen-age dances for the summer months.

Little League Boundaries Shown; Tryouts Saturday

Boys 9 to 12 years old wishing to play in St. Matthews Little League Baseball this year must live within the area outlined on the map at right, League president Harold Hammon announced.

The north boundary is River Road. The west boundary is Mockingbird Valley and Beauchamp Roads. The south boundary is Taylorsville Road, Hurstbourne Lane, and Shelbyville Road. The east boundary is Goose Creek, Brownsboro Road, Goose Creek Road, Hounz Lane and Dorsey Lane.

There will be three leagues this year of four teams each. Each team will have 15 boys.

Registration days are Saturdays, March 9 and March 16, from 10 to 2 p.m. at the V.F.W. Hall, 113 N. Sherrin Ave.

The rest of the schedule:
April 2, parents' meeting V.F.W. Hall, 8 p.m.

April 6—first try-outs, Community Center, 9 to 11 a.m. for 9 and 10-year-olds, and 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. for 11 and 12-year-olds.

April 13 — second try-outs, same place, same schedule.

April 20 — third tryouts, same place, same schedule.

(In case of rain on any of the above dates, the rained-out sessions will be held on Saturday, April 27, same time, same place.)

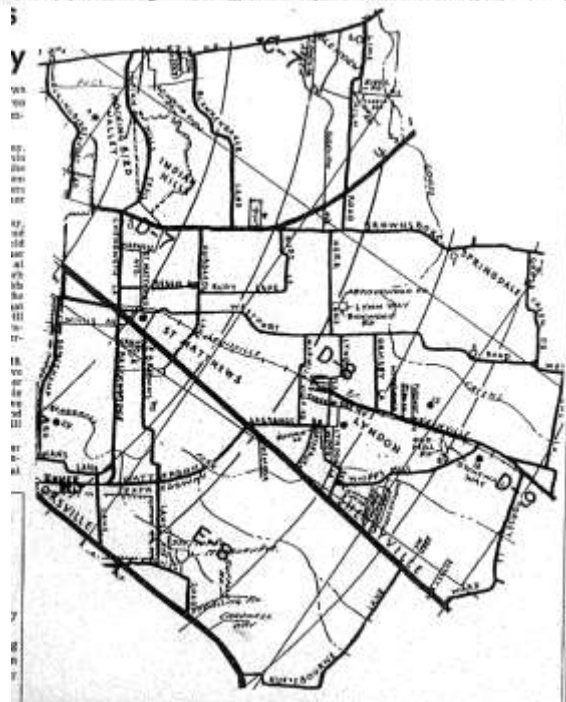
Cut-off day will be Saturday, May 11. Managers will turn into their players-agents a list of the boys they are dropping from their squads. Dropped players will be formed into a minor league.

Mr. Hammon said Saturday, May 4, Saturday, May 11, and Friday, May 17 will be Field Days. "Fathers and any other volunteer help will gather at the field and perform such work as is necessary to put both fields in perfect playing shape," he said. "It goes without saying that this must be done, and we will need every father's full cooperation to complete this job to perfection."

Opening day will be May 18. A parade to the field will leave Trinity High at 9:30 a.m. After ceremonies, there will be six regularly scheduled games, two at 11 a.m., two at 1 p.m. and two at 3 p.m. Both fields will be used.

The league will hold a regular monthly business meeting Monday, March 11, at 7:30 p.m. at the V.F.W. Hall.

St. Matthews Has Best Little League In South

In this week's paper, The Voice is happy to announce the rosters of the 12 teams in the three leagues of St. Matthews Little League Baseball for 1957, plus the four teams of minor league players.

This is the fifth year of this fine program for boys in the St. Matthews area. The three major leagues alone will give 180 boys between the ages of nine and 12 a chance to play 18 regular league games this summer under the supervision of local parents who serve as League officials.

Eighty more boys will have an opportunity to play in the minor league. And to take care of the rapidly expanding needs of this community Little League this year will have a second fine ballpark ready for play next to the older park on the Community Center grounds.

The people of St. Matthews may well be proud of their league. No other community in the entire South, so far as we have been able to determine, can boast of the accomplishments of St. Matthews Little League. No other community has two ballparks. No other community has three major leagues.

And let us not overlook our local businesses and civic clubs who have supported and sponsored teams in the leagues.

We wish to praise particularly those businesses and clubs which have supported teams every year from the first—Shoven Shop, Colonial Federal Savings and Loan Association, Citizens Fidelity Bank and Trust Co., the St. Matthews Lions Club, the Kentucky Model Shop, and Pryor's Restaurant.

This year, the League, under the presidency of Harold Hammon, is not content to depend for support solely upon donations by clubs and businesses. The ball-players and their parents are earning money for the League. In this endeavor, they need the cooperation of the community.

The Little Leaguers are not asking for charity. On the contrary, they are offering a show that is well worth the money. This is the spring show of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America. The Louisville Chapter is staging two shows Saturday, May 11, at 7 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. at the Louisville Memorial Auditorium. The show will feature four quartets including the past international champions, The Mil-States Four, and the Kentucky Champion Louisville Barbershop Chorus. Tickets are on sale at the Kentucky Model Shop, 3805 Wilmington Ave., in St. Matthews. They are also being sold by the Little Leaguers and their parents. 1957 Rosters Announced For 16 Teams In St. Matthews Little League Baseball

Rosters for 1957 of the three major leagues and one minor loop of St. Matthews Little League Baseball were released this week by League officials.

Despite bad weather the past few weeks, the team managers and officials held tryouts and got their final rosters together in time for the weekend deadline.

The managers now have the job of whipping their teams into final shape for opening day Saturday, May 18.

St. Matthews Little League is bigger than ever this year. There are three major leagues and one triple A league, and they will play in two separate ball parks. Up to this year, there were two major leagues and only one ball park.

Workmen last week were putting the final touches on the new ballpark. It will have a press box and dugouts, just like the original

Little League park, built back in 1933.

The new major league is the International League. There will be four teams, sponsored by the St. Matthews Kiwanis Club, Thurston Cooke Ford, the Highland Kiwanis Club, and the Bank of Louisville.

A general meeting of the St. Matthews Little League has been called for 7:30 p. m. Monday, May 6, at the V.F.W. Hall, 113 N. Sherrin, by president Harold Hammon.

All officials, managers and fathers are urged to attend.

The four teams in the National League are sponsored by Lincoln Income Life Insurance, Showers Shop, Colonial Federal Savings and Loan Association, and Kentucky Model Shop. All these sponsors, except Lincoln Income, have been with the League since it opened in 1953.

National League teams are sponsored by Ashbury-Berman Drugs, the St. Matthews Lions Club, Citizens Fidelity Bank and Trust Co.,

and Pryor's Restaurant. All but Ashbury-Berman have sponsored teams in this league since it opened in 1953.

Triple A league teams are being sponsored by Whirligig Restaurant, Franck Hardware, Holland Furnace and Thornbury Bicycles and Toys.

Kitchen, McConnell Hurl No-Hitters To Climax Little League Opening Day

Two no-hit games provided a grand climax for the formal opening Saturday of the St. Matthews Little League 1957 season.

In the new International League, right-hander Billy Kitchen set the St. Matthews Kiwanis team down without a hit, to lead his Highland Kiwanis to a 10-1 victory.

Over in the National League, Bob McConnell of Ashbury-Berman shut out the Pryors without a hit.

left-hander almost had a perfect game. He faced only 19 men in the regulation six innings. He struck out 15 men and got the 16th, third baseman Danny West, on a fly in center in the third. He walked only one man.

His 17 strikeouts are thought to be a record for St. Matthews Little League, which opened in 1953, but the records have not yet been checked.

His teammates backed him up solidly, pounding two Pryor pitchers for 14 hits.

A weak defense marred Billy Kitchen's big victory. He walked the lead-off man, second baseman Dan McFarland, in the first inning, and Merrifield stole second, third and home for the first run.

The St. Matthews Kiwanis held the 1-0 lead until the top of the fourth, when Billy's teammate finally got moving and scored two runs.

The 11-year-old Kitchen had good control. He walked only one man as he struck out eight. This was the second no-hitter of his career. Last year he tossed one in the Minor League. His record last year was six wins and one loss.

Billy almost lost his no-hitter in the last inning. Two St. Matthews Kiwanis batted and in order and one of them got a hit. Both men were called out.

Billy said he used mostly a fast ball to gain his victory. He said he didn't know he had a no-hitter going until the top of the sixth. He lives in Moorpark.

McConnell, 12, of Ten Brueck, tossed up a fast ball with a curve to gain his big victory. He is in his third year of Little League play. His record last year was 2-1.

Bob said he knew he had a no-hitter "all the way." He said he was "really tired" in the last inning, but he wasn't nervous. Since last season he has grown six inches but has remained at 130 pounds, according to his father, William McConnell. (More Little League news in Sports Section.)

ceremony that included a full-dress parade through St. Matthews and introduction of the Little League's top brass.

The 260 members of the Little League embarked from Our Lady of Lourdes Church at 8:30 a.m. in a mobile unit of some 75 cars, four trucks and two fire engines belonging to the St. Matthews and Lyndon Fire Departments.

A police escort led the parade down Breckenridge Lane, up Lexington Road, around Bauer Avenue, and out Shelbyville Road to the battleground at the Community Center.

The cars, mostly convertibles, bore streamers and placards indicating individual teams in the league. The battle cry "We're going to win the league this year" rose above the honking of horns and the whine of sirens.

St. Matthews police officers, stationed at strategic points along the route, kept traffic flowing smoothly throughout the parade.

The parade arrived at the Community Center at 10 a.m. where the young army disembarked and lined up around the outfield of the battleground. The sun shone brightly and the thermometer read 77 degrees after rain had threatened earlier in the morning.

George Walsh, program director for WHAS radio, then took command of pre-operation ceremonies. He introduced Rev. Walter Lawrenson, pastor of Beargrass Christian Church, who delivered the invocation.

He said that "healthy play and free competition, without any form of sadism, is a way of life." He told the youngsters to play "as if Christ was playing with them."

Mr. Walsh, in introducing Harold Hammon, president of the Little League, said "opening day is one day in which all teams are in first place, and that makes it a lot easier for the president of the league to say something."

And Mr. Hammond did have something to say.

He first gave a "sincere thanks to all those people who have helped the Little League." He then had a message for the players, reminding them that "everyone of you is a little gentleman and don't forget it while in the Little League."

He told them to "win with modesty" and told the managers

that they were "models for the boys."

Mr. Walsh then introduced the Little League officials: Charles Siggel, vice-president of the National League; Henry Mann, vice-president of the International League; Jim Schollenberger, vice-president of the American League; Hunter Look, secretary of the American League, Frank Ogle, treasurer of the American League, and Jim Thornbury, head of the Triple A League.

Bill Burwinkle, commander of the Zachary Taylor Post-American Legion, presented the Little League with a new American flag.

He said in a short speech that it was his "sincere hope that not one boy here will ever have to be eligible for membership to a veteran's organization."

The introduction ceremonies were livened with interesting comments by Mr. Walsh.

When Mayor Noland, who was tied up with mayorial duties at City Hall, failed to acknowledge his introduction, Mr. Walsh said: "That'll be the shortest speech the Mayor ever made."

As Mr. Walsh introduced each team, the members let out a yell and threw their caps into the air. Errors were numerous and Mr. Walsh commented:

"I hope you catch balls better than those caps, boys."

Mr. Walsh, in reminding the 200-odd spectators that the league was moving into the fifth year, said:

"Five years ago the value of the community to the Little League was the important issue. Today the Little League is in a position to show its value to the community."

He also noted that "while most professional leagues are losing teams every year, the Little League is gaining teams."

He was speaking of the additions of a new major league — the International League — and a minor league — the Triple A League—this season. The St. Matthews Little League now has four leagues in competition.

After the introductions, Mr. Walsh glanced at his watch. "It is now 10:29," he said. "In another minute the season will open with the Bank of Louisville meeting Thurston Cooke and Highland Kiwanis meeting St. Matthews Kiwanis in the International League."

He counted off the seconds.
"It is now 10.30. Play ball!"

Last Saturday, Corky and his Lion team mates showed Bob and the Ashburys how it feels. Corky set the Ashburys down without a hit, as the Lions won 7-1.

For Corky, it was the highlight of a five-year career in St. Matthews Little League Baseball. Corky was a member of the original Lions team back in 1953, the first year of Little League Baseball in St. Matthews.

His dad, Walter Bales, managed the pennant-winning Lions that year. Corky was only an eight-year-old bench rider. The team, composed of outstanding ballplayers like Lloyd Peyton and Ivan Innes, looked upon the little fellow as a sort of team mascot.

But this year, Corky is grown up.

He is 12 years old, the top age limit for Little League, and a great player in his own right.

Nobody Will Ever Match Record Of These Boys

Bruce "Corky" Bales and John Cecil have set a record that will never be matched in St. Matthews Little League Baseball.

They are now playing their fifth year in the league. They made their respective teams way back in 1953, Little League's first year in St. Matthews, when they were eight years old.

It will be impossible for anyone ever to match their records. For since 1953, the Little League age limit has been raised from eight to nine years old.

Both boys are still with their original National League teams—Corky with the Lions and John with the Citizens. Back in 1953, of course, they were just subs. Now they are regulars.

John is a shortstop and pitcher. Corky a pitcher and catcher. Corky has already won fame this year by pitching a no-hit game May 25 against the Ashbury-Berman team.

Corky's forte is defense. On the strength of his abilities as a catcher and sometimes second baseman, he made the National League All Star team last year. His hitting was not bad for the year. His average was only .216 but he got 11 hits including two home runs (one a grand slam), and drove in 11 runs.

The two home runs may not sound like many, but only one other player in the League matched that record in 1956. As a matter of fact, only eight home runs were hit all year in the National League.

Corky has an unfortunate propensity for striking out. He did it 17 times last year. On his first seven trips to the plate this season, he walked twice and struck out five times. But that was understandable. When you're pitching a no-hit game, your mind is on other things besides getting a hit.

Corky's dad, Walter Bales, managed the Lions the first two seasons. Under Mr. Bales' tutelage, the Lions won the pennant in 1953, but lost their entire first team in 1954 and nearly every game. They finished last.

After rising to second in 1955 (they lost the pennant to Eermann's in a one-game playoff), they copped the pennant last year. Corky thinks they'll do it again this year. He may be right. The Lions won two of their first three this year.

Baker's No-Hitter Avenges Braves On Schwartz, Cubs

Johnny Baker, the one-man battery, and the Braves gained sweet revenge Saturday on Duane Schwartz and the Cubs.

Johnny climaxed a five-year career in St. Matthews organized baseball by pitching a no-hit, no-run ball game to lead the Braves to a 10-0 decision over the Cubs.

The victory left the Braves in second place in the Babe Ruth League and first place in the National Division, and it dumped the Cubs into third place in the entire league.

Baker, a 15-year-old right-hander, using curves, fast balls, and an occasional knuckler, notched his fourth victory against a single defeat. He walked only three men and struck out 10.

Johnny and his teammates earlier this year were the victims of a no-hitter tossed by Schwartz. They went all out Saturday to make it up, and were successful. They also killed whatever hopes the Cubs had left to win the pennant. The Cubs were pre-season favorites to take the title, but are now in third behind the Braves and the Indians.

Baker, who catches for the Braves when he is not pitching, is in his second and last year of Babe Ruth League. Previously he had played one year in the St. Matthews Pony League, and previous to that, he played two years in St. Matthews Little League. Saturday's game was his first no-hitter.

The Indians, needing only one win to clinch the crown, got a jolt Monday evening, when Dick Milne and the Red Sox beat them 1-0 after a terrific battle.

Milne held the leaders to a single hit. Butch Rucker pitched great ball for the losers, giving up only two hits, but a single by Kalb-fleisch in the fifth sent the walk-

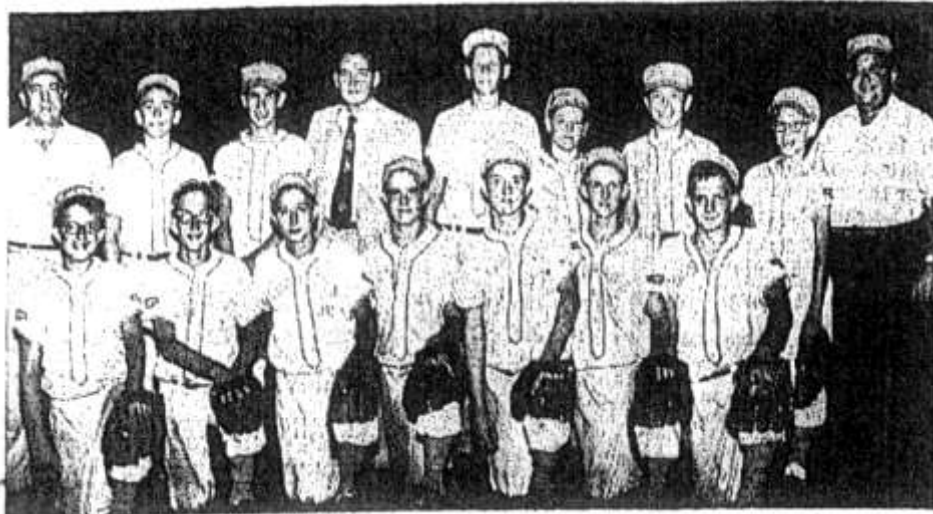

Weaver, Cecil, Bales Give Lions Pennant

There was no lack of thrills in the National League finish last week as the Lions Club took the pennant by virtue of a no-hit game and two near no-hitters.

The Lion heroes were Skip Weaver, John Cecil and Corky Bales in just about that order. And Johnny is not even a member of the Lions Club, but is the star pitcher and shortstop for the rival Citizens.

After the games of Tuesday of last week, the Ashbury Berman team with a 12-5 record led the League, half a game ahead of the Lions with an 11-5 record.

On Thursday, the Lions went into tie for the lead by beating the Citizens 2-1 behind Corky Bales' one-hit pitching.

That made the outcome depend on what happened in the final games of the season Saturday. The Lions were scheduled against the last-place Pryors, and the Ashbury Bermans had to face the tougher, third-place Citizens.

Lion manager Carl Porter was up against it. His two star pitchers, Mike Patrick and Bales, had already pitched during the week and were ineligible. He therefore gambled on 11-year-old Skip Weaver, who hadn't hurled a complete game all year.

With the chips down, the little right-hander came through. Using an "inshout" drop that I didn't know I had," Skip held the Pryors to exactly no hits.

It was the seventh no-hitter of the season in the National League, a record for St. Matthews Little League, and the Lions, led by Patrick with two hits, and Bales with three doubles, put together a 3-0 victory.

Skip almost had a perfect game, as he gave up only two walks, and struck out nine. His mates backed him up in the field. They didn't make a single error.

The victory gave the Lions a half-game lead. But if the Ashburys beat the Citizens, the League would be dead-locked again.

and a playoff would have been necessary.

That wouldn't have been so good, because then the Ashburys could have used their star pitcher, Bob McConnell. McConnell on Tuesday showed he had the Lions' number by whipping them 3-0 and giving up only two hits. Thanks to John Cecil and his Citizens teammates, no playoff was necessary. The Ashbury's went down to defeat 3-0.

Cecil, in champion form, came heartbreakingly close to having a no-hitter. For five full innings, he held the Ashburys hitless and gave up only one walk, while striking out 10. But he had to be yanked after the fifth inning. Because of a previous pitching stint, he was ineligible to pitch any more than five innings.

His teammate, Randy Atkinson, took over in the last inning and though he got in trouble by giving up a walk and a double to Chick, he got through the last inning scoreless.

Charlie Meyer's first-inning homer with one man aboard was the winning blow.

It was the Lion's second pennant in a row and their third in the five years of St. Matthews Little League Baseball.

St. Matthews edged Bowling Green 3-2 on a run in the fifth and two in the sixth. Bowling Green came back with two in the seventh but Denny Robinson finally cut them off in time.

Robinson gave up five hits, the same number St. Matthews got off Gordon. Denny gave up eight walks and struck out eight.

He helped his own cause by driving in one run with a single.

Bob Baker held Paducah to six hits as St. Matthews was pounding out its 14-1 victory Thursday. Left-fielder Dick Atwell led the attack with a grand slam home run and a single in three trips.

In addition, Mr. Look is an intelligent and conscientious man, with a tremendous interest in recreation programs in particular and the welfare of the St. Matthews community in general. We look forward to another great Little League year in 1958.

American League—Pryors, Highland Kiwanis, Model Shop, Thurston Cooke, Colonial Federal, and Bank of Louisville.

National League—Citizens Fidelity, Ansbury-Berman, St. Matthews Kiwanis, Lincoln Income, Lions Club, and Showers Shop.

The change was made to simplify the scheduling. The League has two standard Little League Baseball parks operating on the Community Center grounds.

Other officers elected Monday were:

Henry Mann, vice president in charge of the American League, succeeding Jim Shollenberger; Joe Neal, vice president in charge of the National League, succeeding Charles Siegel; Walter Bickel, secretary, and Robert Jacobs, treasurer.

Mr. Look was treasurer of the League in 1953, its first year here. Since then, he has served as secretary. His store, the Kentucky Model Shop in Wallace Center, has sponsored an American League team, the Models, since the beginning of the League here.

He opened the Model Shop in 1946 at 3513 Frankfort and moved to the present location in 1950. He and his wife, the former Vera

Great sports year: The year 1958 saw St. Matthews come into its own in the field of sports. This was particularly true in, baseball, as St. Matthews teams won five championships and two State titles.

Little League began its sixth season here in May and it was obvious from the start that St. Matthews was in for a great year. A flood of boys 9 to 12 years old came for tryouts, and, after two major leagues of six teams each were formed, there were enough boys left over to form two minor leagues of four team each.

By the first of July, the Models had won the American League title for the second time in three years, and Ashbury Berman had the National League title sewed up.

In the American League, three records fell, as the Models won 14 games out of 15, and their star pitcher, Jim Helm, won seven games without a loss. Bill Ransom, of the second place Thurston Cooke team, broke the league record for strikeouts, getting 108, against only 22 walks.

Twelve-year-old Barney Neal copped practically every National League honor. The Ashbury Berman star pitched victories without a defeat, and struck out 73 men to lead the league. He also led the league in hitting with a batting average of .538. His five home runs and six doubles also led the league.

Win State title: In the post season tourney, the American All Stars, paced by Mike Graven's seventh inning homer, won a stirring last minute 9-8 victory over Algonquin in the finals of the Area Tournament.

Launching the greatest sustained hitting attack in the history of St. Matthews Little League, the Americans pounded Glasgow 16-5 and Fort Knox 9-0 to win the District title, and copped the State championship by defeating Paducah 6-2.

The Tigers sewed up the Babe Ruth League pennant July 1, when John Thompson pitched a one-hit, 3-0 victory over the second place Red Sox. Thompson then proceeded to pitch the St. Matthews Americans into the State tourney, as he beat the St. Matthews Nationals 4-0 for the local title. The Americans lost out to Campbellsville in the State.

Meanwhile, in the American Legion Leagues the St. Matthews Zachary Taylor team was on the rampage. The Reds defeated Owensboro 10-3 to win the Western Sectional, and then, by virtue of Ronnie Barrow's grand slam homer, beat Latonia 7-3 for the State title.

Take MABA title: And to round out St. Matthews greatest baseball season, the St. Matthews Merchants won their second straight Metropolitan Amateur Baseball Association title by beating the Police twice in the playoff, 17—13 and 13—1, at Trinity Field.

How Governor Chandler can help Little League

Gov. Chandler has plenty of reason to be angry at Louisville and Jefferson County, because it is the center of his political opposition, and he has had a fine time getting even during this session of the Legislature. He has punished this community, mainly by his plan to move the Health Department from here to Frankfort, and there does not seem to be much we can do about it.

However, there's no reason why the Governor should want to punish the children of our community. He now has a real opportunity to help them and at no cost to himself.

In St. Matthews, we have a fine Little League Baseball program. This program is only part of a State-wide organization, and of course there are many other Little Leagues in Louisville and Jefferson County. But we can speak only for our own.

We have 12 major league teams and four minor league teams of 15 boys each. We have two ball diamonds. So that all these teams can play a full schedule during the summer, they must use these diamonds not only on Saturday, but also during the week.

Because all the managers, scorekeepers, umpires and other officials are men who work for a living, the games cannot start until 6 p.m. That means that each day, one full game can be played on each diamond — providing we are on daylight saving time.

A Little League game takes 1½ to two hours to play, and with daylight saving time, the sunlight is adequate for play until 8 p.m. If we are forced on standard time, then it begins to get dark at 7 p.m. That would give us only one hour, which is not enough to complete a game.

The House and Senate have passed a bill to kill daylight saving time in Kentucky. It is a vicious bill because it makes it virtually impossible for any community to adopt even voluntary daylight saving time. It is beyond our comprehension what business it is of other people if we here in the City want to set our clocks ahead an hour, but apparently they are so blinded by prejudice against us that they would do anything to curtail our freedom.

Gov. Chandler used to be commissioner of baseball. He must still be vitally interested in the welfare of that sport, not to mention the welfare of the children of Kentucky. Little League is for boys nine to 12 years old, and it would be unjustly cruel to pass any measure that would cripple this fine program.

In the interests of these boys, we call upon the Governor to veto the bill forbidding us to go on daylight saving time.

Little League hopefuls might be disappointed

A lot of boys going out for St. Matthews Little League Baseball will be disappointed unless their parents come through for them and the League can work out scheduling and financial problems.

That was the conclusion drawn from figures released Monday by League president Hunter Look.

Mr. Look revealed that a record-breaking 242 boys aged nine to 12 signed up for Little League Saturday. That's 100 more than signed up the first day last year. "It was a bigger turnout by far than we anticipated," he said.

Final registrations this coming Saturday, which will be held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Community Center, are expected to swell this figure considerably.

Also there are about 150 major league players returning from last year.

Yet the present League set up, which includes 12 major and four minor league teams of 15 boys each will accommodate only 240 boys.

Asked if more minor league teams could be added, Mr. Look said the League was willing. However, "expansion of the minors depends on scheduling of play facilities, recruiting adequate personnel from the parents and financing," he said.

He said that unless parents volunteer to act as umpires, managers and scorekeepers, it will be impossible for the League to add any more teams.

He said also that if this community does not go on daylight saving time, it will hurt the program. He explained that week-day games start at 6 p.m. and require 1½ to two hours to finish. Without last time, there won't be sufficient light for some games, he said.

He further warned that all boys wishing to take part in tryouts starting April 5 must register, if he did not play on a major league team last year. Tryouts will also be held April 12 and 19.

"That means all boys who played in the minors last year have to reregister this year," he said.

Little League needs extra hour of daylight

If everybody would start going to work an hour earlier in the summer, it would be a great help to St. Matthews Little League.

That was the observation of League president Hunter Look this week, following the enactment into State law of a bill forbidding anyone to go on Daylight Saving Time, voluntary or otherwise.

"Slow time creates a problem for adult personnel," said Mr. Look. "We need that additional hour of daylight."

He said it hasn't been decided yet, but League officials are talking about starting the games at 5 p.m. daily instead of 6 p.m. But that would be hard on the managers, umpires, scorekeepers and other adult volunteer workers, most of whom don't leave work until that time.

But something must be done, he said, because starting the

games at 6 p.m. on slow time would not allow enough time to finish the games before dark.

He said "concerted action" in the form of everyone going to work an hour earlier would be "a big help."

A total of 358 boys have signed up for Little League, including 116 who registered last Saturday, he said. With the 108 boys returning from last year's major league teams, a total of 468 boys will be vying for only 240 positions on 12 major and four minor league teams.

The question of forming more teams to take care of more players will be discussed at the annual parents' meeting March 31 at 8 p.m. at the Community

Center Building, according to Mr. Look.

He said, however, that he didn't see how any more games could be scheduled on the League's two diamonds. Last summer, the 16 teams kept the diamonds occupied every even-

ing except Sunday, and all day Saturday.

He hinted, but did not say, that it might be necessary to add a third diamond and park.

Tryouts will be held April 5, 12, and 19 at the Center. Opening day will be Saturday, May 17.

Letter To Editor

Editorial unfair to Community Center

To the editor:

The editorial which appeared in last week's VOICE, "We Need More Projects Like the One at Strivers," seems to indicate that the long-established St. Matthews Community Center had nothing to offer outside of baseball and football. I don't think that the writer intended his remarks to mean what they appeared to indicate.

The people in this area should be informed that the facilities in existence at the Community Center possibly could not be duplicated for less than \$100,000. Where else in this area can you find three very fine baseball diamonds; an excellent wading pool for children, playground equipment such as swings, sliding boards, see-saws, a lot containing sliding board, teeter boards and sand boxes; a picnic area containing cooking grills, picnic tables and shady grounds that are as comfortable as the public parks which are maintained by tax revenues; hard-surface courts for paddle tennis and badminton; basketball boards; volleyball court, and room to extend these facilities? There is also the Community Center building and service buildings.

For a number of years we have had excellent trained supervisors at the Community Center through the courtesy of the County's Recreation Board.

The greatest problem that exists at the Community Center is lack of adequate financial aid to sponsor some of the programs being advocated by the committee now trying to stimulate interest in more recreation in St. Matthews.

The baseball programs have been successful because the mothers and dads have given a lot of time, effort and money to these programs. The Community Center has also benefited from these same people in that many of the improvements and much of the maintenance have been performed by volunteer effort. Some of the civic clubs and churches have been very generous in their financial support of the Community Center, but when you attempt to maintain such a huge project on a budget between \$4,000 and \$6,000, which statistics tell us is less than the average man's income per year, you can readily understand what the situation is.

To make it possible for the Community Center to fulfill the demands of the general public will require the same spirit and determination demonstrated by the parents of the baseball players. They did not wait for someone else to do the job for them. They financed their own programs and built their own fields.

If it is assumed that the Community Center finances these baseball programs, this should be cleared up now. Other than paying for the utilities and furnishing the grounds, the baseball programs are wholly self-supporting, through their sponsors and supporters.

Our income barely takes care of necessary expenses and leaves little or nothing for capital improvements, labor costs, or extensive outlays for sponsoring programs.

In my opinion the Community Center has done an outstanding job for this community and those who have made it possible, past and present, are not deserving of the stigma which the editorial places on it. It has survived in spite of many broken promises, adverse publicity, vandalism, and lethargy on the part of some of its supporters who furnish nothing but lip service.

This is in no way a condemnation of the proposal to set up recreation facilities in advantageous spots in our area, which I agree are sorely needed, but a little more concentrated effort and support could make the Community Center what it should be.

Possibly the time has come, when a definite decision should be made with regard to the Community Center. Why should this burden be placed upon the shoulders of a few interested civic-minded people? The time and effort given by a relatively small number of people is far beyond what should be expected, and for what? Criticism, demands, unpleasant remarks, and insults!

Some of the answers to our problem can be given in June, when our Annual Booster Day fund-raising campaign is to be held on Friday and Saturday, the 6th and 7th. Part of the answer can be given at the time of our Baseball March on Thursday, May 22. Part of the answer can be given now.

Any groups, or individuals who are interested, bring your rakes, shovels, and tools to the Community Center on Saturday and Sunday, May 17 and 18, any time between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. A lot of volunteer work needs to be done before the season opens.

Don't give up your individual Community projects, and by the same token — DON'T ABANDON THE COMMUNITY CENTER. It served you when nothing else was available — it is serving you now — and it has all the potential to be desired. Only you can make it a realization.

Summer recreation begins at Community Center June 9

A fully-supervised summer recreation program will begin at the St. Matthews Community Center on Monday, June 9.

The program, under the direction of the Jefferson County Board of Recreation, will run five days a week from 9:30 in the morning to 10 at night. The program will include a wide variety of organized athletics and all kinds of handicrafts.

Two experienced supervisors will guide the recreational activities. Mrs. Thomas Allerton will be at the Center from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Mrs. Allerton will organize the girls' athletic programs and handle all of the arts and crafts activities.

Emmett Goranillo, football coach at Eastern High, will direct the boys' athletic program. He will be at the Center from 2 to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday.

All youngsters in the St. Matthews area are invited to participate in the recreational program. No fee is involved other than the cost of the handicraft materials should a youngster wish to take

home what he or she has made. Since handicraft activities will include painting, sculpting, modeling, weaving, and the like, the cost of the materials involved will be very small.

Organized athletics during the summer recreational program will include baseball, paddle tennis, badminton, volleyball, horseshoes, and others. A special emphasis will be placed on a full-scale girls athletic program this year.

In addition to the recreational program, the facilities of the Community Center, located on Shelbyville Road just west of the Waterson Expressway, will be open as usual to the public. These facilities include paved badminton, paddle tennis and volleyball courts, a large wading pool, horseshoe pits, and a wooded picnic area complete with 18 tables and several grills.

The St. Matthews Community Center is a voluntary organization supported by civic and fraternal groups in the Community, and by an annual Booster Day when the center is the scene of a carnival-like, fun-filled, fund-raising event. This year's Booster Days will be June 6 and 7.

Little League season opens

President Hunter Look's speech at the official Saturday summed up the feelings of parents, boys and sponsors about St. Matthews Little League Baseball.

"This is a proud moment for all of us . . . who have worked long and hard to make possible the opening of the sixth season of St. Matthews Little League," he said.

"This is not my program. This is our program. True, it belongs to the officials in part, but it belongs also in equal parts to every boy on the rosters and to his parents. All of us share an equal responsibility to see that it is conducted on the highest possible level.

"It is a program that has progressed steadily for six years because enough people believed strongly in Little League and its principles, and were willing to work long . . . hours to develop a local program . . .

"That is how we have progressed from one ball field to two . . . from eight sponsors to 20, from 120 boys in the program to our present 300.

"It takes manpower and womanpower to achieve all this. We have five elected officials, eight appointed officials, 40 managers and assistant managers, over 20 trained umpires, plus our new Ladies' Auxiliary with five officers, a representative from each team and a membership at large. "Then we have a host of ex-officio workers, who have proved that salesmen can swing a paint brush, attorneys can swing a shovel, and executives can handle a rake or a hammer.

"All are volunteer help. If at any time you should find fault with their part in the program, first, imagine yourself in their place; then offer to take their place.

"Last and certainly not least, it takes team sponsors — those business firms and civic clubs who show their faith in what we are doing by advancing each year the cash that gets us underway, properly equipped. Of our 12 major league teams, five sponsors are charter members of St. Matthews Little League. (Editor's note: Mr. Look was referring to his own Kentucky Model Shop, Pryor's Restaurant, Citizens Fidelity Bank, the St. Matthews Lions Club and the Showers Shop).

"Above all, this is a program for boys, played by boys. We, as adults, are here to provide it, and make it possible. The boys are here to play it."

Altogether there were nearly 1,000 players and adults at the ceremony, held under a cloudy bright sky.

At about 8:30 the boys assembled at Our Lady of Lourdes Church and climbed aboard fire trucks, station wagons and various other vehicles and had a parade out to the Center grounds.

Master of ceremonies Paul Ruhle introduced Mgr. Anthony G. Gerst, pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes, who gave the invocation, and Mr. Look, who introduced the other League officers.

Mayor James Noland was introduced and made a few remarks, and then the teams, managers, sponsors and representatives were presented.

Also presented were Harold Hammon, immediate past president and the director for the Southern Regional Tournament that will be played in St. Matthews this summer; Marvin T. Bradford, Southern Regional director; and William Burwinkle, past president of the American Legion Zachary Taylor Post 180.

Mr. Burwinkle presented an American flag from Post 180 to be mounted on the scoreboard. It was accepted by representatives of the Showers, Lions and Thurston Cooke teams, pennant winners in last year's three leagues.

Bruce Shollenberger and Bruce Steller represented Showers, Walter Mason and Doug Roederer, the Lions and Bill Ransom and Latham Speiden, Thurston Cooke.

These boys took the flag to the scoreboard and up it went to the playing of the Star Spangled Banner.

Then, surrounded by cheering players, Mayor Noland took the mound and threw the first ball, with Hunter Look catching. The first pitch was low and outside, and everybody insisted that the Mayor throw again. His second pitch was also low and outside. Finally, on the third try, the Mayor got it over the plate.

Then the seasons play started.

In the National League, The St. Matthews Kiwanis beat Lincoln Income 4-2 in the first game. The Lions edged Showers 4-3, despite Bruce Shollenberger's home run. Ashbury Berman, paced by Barney Neal who batted in five runs with a triple and home run, defeated Citizens Fidelity 8-4.

In the American League, Pryor's won the opener, defeating Dairy Queen 5-4. Kentucky Model Shop crushed Bank of Louisville 7-1 behind Jim Helm's three-hit pitching. And despite the fact that Bill Ransom set 16 of them down on strikes, Pendergrass Chevrolet edged Thurston Cooke 5-4.

Beat last place Pryors 8-6 with late rally to take title

The win gave Ashbury a 10-1 record, putting them three games ahead of second place Citizens. The Citizens have only two games left to play. Ashbury has one.

Showers pitcher Bruce Scott entered pitched well enough to win most games, 4-3 or 5-3, but three outs and four walks which striking out 11. But it wasn't his day.

The Ashburys' clutch up the grueling pitchers' list on the top of the fifth inning. Both their runs. Cord opened it with a walk. He went to second on a

This newspaper has just one minor criticism of the program. We think the night games ought to be eliminated. Half the games are played in daylight at 6 p.m. but the other half are under the lights at 8 p.m.

These night games seem dangerous to us. When one of those big 15-year-old pitchers uncorks a fast ball, about all the batter can see is a blur, white around the top, and gray everywhere else. Outfielders stumble around under high flies, unable to judge the range and speed of the descending ball.

These night games draw big crowds because they're at a convenient hour. However, the convenience of the spectators is a secondary consideration in this program which is not commercial and is not intended to be.

The safety and fun of the boys is paramount, and it seems to us they'd have a lot more fun if they could see the ball better and didn't have to worry about getting hit.

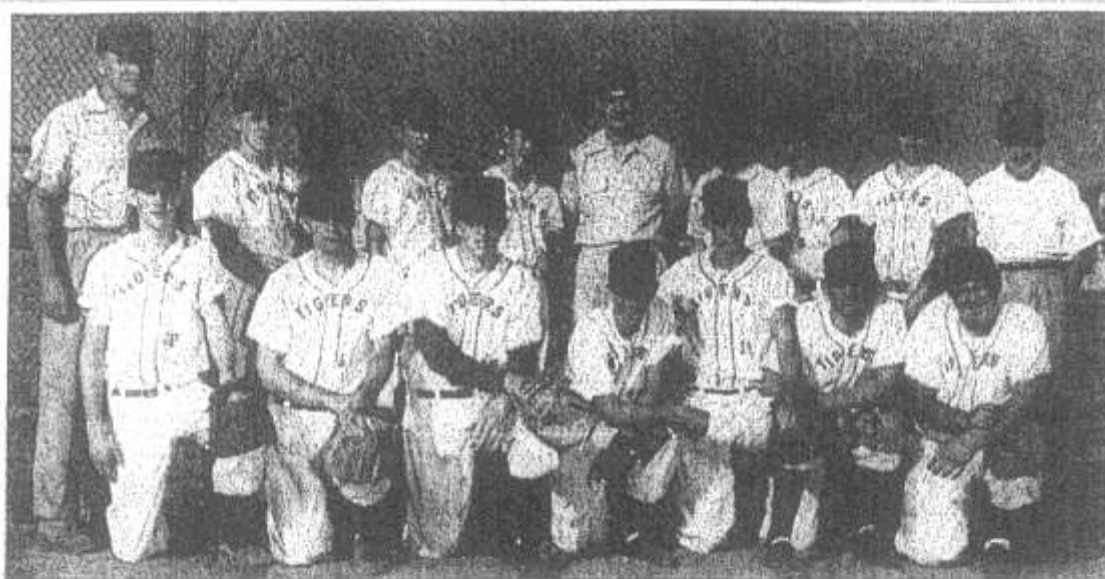

Two of them were homers — by Graven and Brian — Mike's coming in the first with one on, and Tim's coming in the fifth with two aboard to break a 2-2 tie.

The St. Matthews Americans are now at Frederick, Md., for the Divisional Tournament, scheduled for today, Friday, and Saturday. If they win there, they come back to the St. Matthews Community Center where the Regional Tournament will be played Aug. 14-16.

But no matter how they do in Maryland, the local baseball community is aware that in winning the State title they have gone further than any other All Star team from St. Matthews.

Their manager, Jim Helm, a hard taskmaster, unbent a little on Monday. "They met the challenge," he said. "Schott and Ja-

cobs were both great in the State. There's a better spirit on this club than any I've ever had. That's why they rose to the occasion.

"We've had good fielding, good hitting and good pitching. Winning the title was a team victory. We've gone into six ball games with six different pitchers, and they came through."

Which one would he use in the opener at Maryland?

The answer was lefty Bill Ransom, the no-hit pitcher, the ace of the league, who racked up a record-breaking 108 strikeouts in eight games, while giving only 21 walks, during the regular season.

Big Sam Gruniesen, right fielder for the Reds, cracked two home runs, one a tremendous blast over the trees behind the center field wall and drove in six runs to lead the Red's attack.

Bobby Marr, the chunky left-hander who has yet to be beaten, started for the Reds and

pitched seven and two-thirds innings before being lifted in favor of Jim Merrill, after he had walked the bases full.

Although Marr pitched a two-hitter and had a shutout until Mel Wilhite cracked a home run to lead off the eighth inning, he didn't seem sharp and had trouble nipping the corners. He walked 10 men but partially made up for that by striking out 15.

Ed Allen started for Owensboro and got through the first two innings before the Reds got to him in the third, with Gruniesen getting his tape measure clout.

Dan Brown led off the inning with a topper down the third base line which he beat out. Then after he had stolen second, Dick Atwell punched a single into right to move him on around. Allen seemed to be out of the inning when Campbell fanned and Ferriell forced Atwell, but Marr drew a pass and Gruniesen followed with his tremendous blast to move the Reds out in front 4-0.

They picked up two more in the fifth when Tom Campbell led off with a single and was safe at second when the second baseman threw Bill Ferriell's grounder into left field. Marr moved them up with a grounder to first, and Gruniesen was intentionally walked to fill the bases.

Reds win State championship

Barrow blast turns tide for locals

Leland Melear weathered a rocky fifth inning to pitch shutout ball the rest of the way, and Ronnie Barrow blasted a grand-slam home run in the sixth to spark the Zachary Taylor Reds to a 7-3 triumph at the St. Matthews Community Center Saturday afternoon.

Ronnie Barrow, the Red's slick fielding shortstop, who had been batting eighth in the lineup and had struck out his first two trips to the plate, walloped a 310-foot grand-slam home run in the sixth to give the Reds all the runs they needed. The Reds, who were trailing 3-1 going into the sixth, had already shoved in two tallies to tie up the game when Barrow cleaned the bases.

After three scoreless innings, the Reds jumped into the lead with a run in the fourth. Sam Grunlesen bounced to the shortstop, who threw wild into the bench, allowing Sam to go all the way to second. Leland Melear followed with a single to right field to score Grunlesen, and at the time appeared to have won his own ball game.

However, Latonia, who had to win to stay in the tournament, fought back gamely in the fifth to shove across three markers. Little Steve Chisenhall got things off with a bang when he led off with a blow over the wall in left center to tie the game up. They weren't through yet, though, and Tieman, pinch-hitti-

Tieman did score though, on Bob Barton's grounder to short, outrunning the throw. After Neville popped up, Wayne Slusher cracked a double to right center to send Tranter scooting home with their third run of the inning. Here Melear shut the door, getting Thelan via strikeout, and Steffen on a grounder to second.

The Reds went down quietly in their half of the inning, but erupted with a big six in the sixth to earn their tickets to North Carolina. Bill Ferrell started the fireworks with a single to center and advanced to second on a passed ball.

Bobby Marr delivered a single to center and went to second on the throw to the plate which made Ferrell decide to stay at third. Ferrell scooted in when Grunlesen singled to left, but Marr, trying to do the same thing, was out at the plate on a nice throw from the left fielder. Leland Melear was safe when the second baseman threw wide on

his grounder, Grunlesen moving to third. The Reds tied the game up with a bit of fancy base-running.

On Neville's first pitch to Tom Eddelman, Melear took off for second. When the catcher made a throw there, he stopped right in the middle, and got himself right in the middle of a run-down. While they were chasing him down, Grunlesen trotted home from third with the tying run.

To add insult to injury, though, Melear slid safely into second when the shortstop dropped the throw. Eddelman then singled be-

hind the bag at second and stole second.

With men on second and third, Don Brown, who had homered in the first game of the series, was given an intentional pass to get the stage for Barrow's climatic clout. His grand-slammer brought Jim Hoerlien to the mound, and he held the Reds at bay the rest of the game.

However, Melear got untouchable with that four-run lead, and Latonia got only one more man as far as second base, as the Reds continued undefeated on their drive toward the National Championship.

Regional Little League teams out on beautiful exhibition

Two boys, ages 11 and 12, and a girl, age 10, were the stars of the St. Matthews last Wednesday afternoon, and from then on Saturday were treated to a thrilling and exciting game in their life.

The fifteen of the boys the first exhibition were very exciting. These boys were the members of the Camden National All Stars. From Camden, N.J., they were the ones who emerged victorious in the regional Little League tournament, held at the St. Matthews Community Center August 14.

They went on to Williamsport, Pa., to participate in the Little League "World Series" Aug. 19-20, approximately 1,200 cheering, smiling parents and fans were out to see the beautiful exhibition of baseball as the four

teams fought bitterly through their six-inning games here. As is always the case when so many fine teams clash, it was the team which fought the hardest and made its own breaks that came out on top.

And that's exactly what Camden did. The All-Stars played hard and scored the breaks set for them. Then they scored three runs together with the most powerful weapon in baseball, the home run, and came out with a winning solution.

In the final game, it was their power which brought them the victory. Of course, Jan Douglas, two-hits pitched game too. Jan, a tall stocky-built boy, who threw a perfect ball, was in complete control of the game from start to finish. He struck out 10 men, and walked only three. He was also pretty wild with the stick as he cracked one of the three round-trippers that his team collected in that game. They all two in the first game for a total of five for the season.

The tournament started Thursday afternoon with a very colorful pregame ceremony. The first game, played at the St. Matthews Presbyterian Church, started the festivities with a prayer for the health and well-being of the boys.

Then Mayor James Nolan of St. Matthews gave a very short speech because, as he said, "I know you are more interested in seeing the boys play, than listening to me talk." They sent it up with five more in the sixth, on four singles, a home run by George Elrod, a walk, and a two base error by Gene Sullivan in left, to make the final margin 15-3.

Marky Moore struck out five and walked four as he coasted to his team's win. The Houston manager couldn't understand what had happened to his team as he said, "They haven't made that many errors in the whole tournament."

In the second game, the second baseman, Longhorne, Va., edged Marietta, Georgia, 8-6 behind Bob Delille's three-hit pitching.

Delille was engaged in a bitter pitching duel with the Marietta pitcher, Darrell Noggle for three innings before Zan Smith, who was added in the fourth inning when one of the boys got hurt and couldn't play, pulled a three-run home run over the center field fence and clear to the Babe Ruth field. They added another run before the inning was over when Steve Stuber drew a walk. Charles Phillips dumped a Texas Leagueer into left field, and Jim Johnson doubled to right to send him home.

They picked up their final run in the fifth when Delille lofted one over the center field wall.

Marietta would see little action with Delille pitching, and he had a no-hitter until the fifth inning. Delille struck out 12 and walked only one, setting an all-time record for the tournament.

The championship game pitted Gardner, clearly the biggest team in the tournament, against Lynn Raven, without a doubt the smallest team in the tournament. The two teams arrived at the ball park about 4 p.m. from K.M.I. where they had been the guests of Col. Richardson and the Cardinals.

At about 4:40, Harold Hammond closed out a brief speech by praising the parents of the St. Matthews Little Leaguers for being what he called the most cooperative in the nation. Then Mr. Bradford, the Regional director, inspired the fans to let the men in blue on the carrying, and to make sure it didn't rain any more than it did, because if it had, all the boys were going to be down in Williamsport, and the game would be played there. Then after the presentation of the trophy, and the National Anthem, the ball game began.

Gardner again waited little time in jumping out in front, as they chased home two runs in the first inning, all after two men were out. Mackey Moore inflicted the first blow when he batted a two-strike pitch over the bench in left. Terry King followed with a double, and Douglas, who wasn't content to just handle the pitching chores, pushed him across with a single to center.

Douglas was right in the middle of things again in the fifth, when he removed one of John Stenacker's pitches clear into the trees beyond the center field wall.

They bought their ticket to Williamsport in the fifth when two big rallies crossed the plate. Moore started it with a ground-rule double which bounced over the wall in left center. Jordan

Community Center extends its program

J. Clarke, president, explained. "We've had our biggest year yet, and we want to let all the folks who have discovered what is available to them, enjoy it as long as possible."

Mr. Clarke pointed out that Emmett Goranflo, Eastern High

coach and one of two recreational supervisors at the Center this summer, would continue on through Labor Day. Mr. Goranflo, at the Center during the afternoons and evenings, conducts a wide variety of sports activities open to all youngsters.

The other supervisor, Mrs.

Louise Allerton, G7 Seminary Village, completed the Center's arts and crafts program earlier this month.

"And what a successful program it was, too," said Mr. Clarke. Mrs. Allerton had from 30 to 35 youngsters daily and she did a wonderful job. I would guess in all ten to three hundred different youngsters participated at one time or another."

The youngsters made many things for themselves, and members of their families, and friends. Their projects included working with metal, wood, gimp, textiles, plaster of Paris, paper, clay and leather.

Mr. Clarke said this year's arts and crafts program was "so successful we will look for some way to expand it next summer."

Clark points out progress in Center fund appeal

"Trying to give the community a playground of good calibre on an inadequate budget is becoming increasingly difficult," Robert J. Clarke, 3617 Hycliffe, president of the St. Matthews Community Center, wrote this week to the church and civic organizations that help sponsor the Center.

His letter was the Center president's annual appeal for contributions from the organizations, which enable the St. Matthews Community Center to function without benefit of support of taxpayers.

Pointing out the improvements that have been made in physical plant and recreational facilities, Mr. Clarke wrote:

"We are again making an appeal to the local church and civic organizations for their annual contribution to help us in operating the Community Center."

"The new filter plant and other plumbing requirements have taken almost two-thirds of the money raised on Booster Day. In addition to these improvements, we have increased our parking facilities, built new tables, and have, at last, succeeded in placing a sign near our entrance road."

"The plumbing, parking area, sign and tables, alone cost us around \$3,000, even though we built the picnic tables and put up the sign with volunteer labor. I might add that the plumbing, grading, and rock were not charged at the usual rates, and much of this work was done at cost."

"This year has been one of the most successful from the standpoint of numbers of people making use of the Community Center and its facilities. Our programs for children were above average in interest and attendance."

"The baseball programs, for which we take no credit, have produced some excellent teams that have given St. Matthews national publicity. Visiting teams and out-of-town visitors have been very flattering in praise of our Center."

"It is unfortunate that many people are still unaware of the tremendous burden and responsibility placed on the small group of people who each year serve on the board of directors. Trying to give the community a playground

of good calibre on an inadequate budget is becoming increasingly difficult."

"This year it will be necessary to dip into our emergency fund (savings account) to pay current bills. It is only through volunteer effort that so much has been accomplished with so little expenditure, but the work load has been on too few people."

"Each month you receive financial reports which show how little is spent for physical maintenance. What it does not show is the number of man-hours required to keep the grounds, equipment, and buildings in repair, most of which is done through volunteer effort."

"Whatever financial assistance you can give us will be appreciated, so that the Community Center can continue to progress, and serve the people in this area."

"We welcome any and all suggestions on ways and means to finance the Center without the necessity of leaning on our civic organizations. Until a better way is found, we are looking to your continued support," Mr. Clarke concluded.

Bears get back two forfeits, finish 7-0 for 5th championship

The Bears are the champions of the St. Matthews Football League for the fifth straight year. The League's Parents Committee last week reversed a previous ruling which had required the Bears to forfeit two games because of alleged illegal recruiting practices.

In a statement following a meeting of the Parent's Committee Nov. 12, chairman Fred Burkel made the following announcement:

"After several hours of discus-

sions and recommendations of these present it was finally moved, duly seconded and passed that since practically all, if not all, of the teams in the league have been guilty of having illegal players that all players on the teams at present be declared eligible for the present year. This motion had the effect of wiping out previous forfeitures of games by the Bears.

"The parent committee took into consideration the feelings of all the boys on the teams and did not think the boys should be punished for the acts of their coaches.

"All coaches are requested to send a complete roster before Nov. 27 to Bill Pickering, secretary. This roster should contain player's name, parent's name, address, telephone number and birth date.

"An all-star team will be picked by the coaches.

The Bears closed out the year Saturday with a 7-0 record, defeating the Browns 34-0. In the other game at Seneca Park, the Lions hung into second by turning back the Colts 37-12.

That perfect record was the first one in St. Matthews Little League action since 1955, when the Bears were 6-0.

By swamping the Browns, the Bears eliminated the mathematical chance which the Lions had enjoyed. Had the Browns won, a previous game between the same two teams which had been postponed would have been played off. If the Bears had lost one, a championship playoff would have been necessary.

The Bears encountered little opposition from the Browns, as they easily marched to the clinching victory.

Center took in \$6,446.05 spent \$7,997.23 in year

The St. Matthews Community Center took in \$6,446.05 for the year which ended Jan. 27, and spent \$7,997.23. The Center was left with a balance of \$2,845.83, according to a report by treasurer William D. Pickering.

The Center operates and maintains a playground and recreation center north of Shelbyville, behind the East Drive-in Theatre. Little League and Babe Ruth League baseball competition is held there, and plays are produced by the St. Matthews Community Theatre.

Biggest item of income were the Booster Day receipts of \$3,187.98. Concession stands brought in another \$1,615.10. Rentals to the City of Beechwood Village, the Community Theatre, and to other organizations brought in \$922.50.

Contributions came to \$938. These included gifts from the Younger Woman's Club of St. Matthews, \$100; Harvey Browne Presbyterian Church, \$100; Bethel E&R Church, \$100; St. Matthews Football League, \$100. St. Matthews Lions \$300; and Amer-

ican Legion Baseball, \$236.

The Babe Ruth League made an additional contribution for ground maintenance of \$127.31. Miscellaneous items brought in the final \$237.14.

The biggest single expenditure was for capital improvements.

Little League meets March 9

Changes this year include World Series and honoring team sponsors

St. Matthews Little League Baseball, Inc., will hold its first general meeting of the year Monday, March 9, at 8 p.m. at the St. Matthews Community Center Building.

League president William McConnell said that all parents whose children hope to play in Little League this year should attend. Schedules and plans for the coming season will be outlined.

Trophies will be awarded to the sponsors of last year's pennant-winning teams. That would be Ashbury-Berman in the National League and Kentucky Model Shop in the American League.

Mr. McConnell further announced that there would be several important changes made in Little League this year.

First of all, there will be a World Series between the National and American League pennant winners. Whichever wins two of three games will be named the champion of St. Matthews. This Series will not be played, however, until the All Star games are out of the way.

Secondly, every Saturday during the season will be Sponsor's Day. A team sponsor will be recognized and honored on that day. St. Matthews has 12 major league teams and eight minors. Each is composed of 15 boys nine to 12 years old.

Mr. McConnell announced with some pride that there is a waiting list for sponsorship of St. Matthews teams. "We didn't lose a single sponsor from last year, and we have four or five on the waiting list," he said.

The sponsor pays the team's league entry fee and every third year buys new uniforms for the players.

The league is also designing a jacket to be worn by all players this year. Mr. McConnell said the jacket would be relatively inexpensive so that all boys could afford it, but would be attractive enough to be worn year round.

The back of the jacket will read "St. Matthews Little League For Boys." Boys picked

for the All-Star teams will be permitted to wear a special patch on the jacket. Pennant-winning teams will also have a special patch. A third patch will be for members of the team winning the World Series.

Also, in an effort to lessen the work load of the team managers, and to bring all parents into the program, the League has introduced a table of organization for each individual ball club.

This organization will be responsible for handling all the business of the ball club, and leaving the team manager solely with the job of coaching the boys. Each organization will be headed by a business manager, who will be answerable to League president McConnell, and vice presidents Louis Chick and Roy Foeman.

"Every parent in the Little League program will be asked to accept a job in a part of the structure," Mr. McConnell said. "An organizational structure has been set up in which every parent can find a job and will be asked to accept one."

Here is the schedule for this season:

Registration — March 21 and 28.

Tryouts — April 4, 11, and 18; and, in case of rain, April 25.

Opening Day — Memorial Day, May 30. There will be a parade and a full schedule of games in both major leagues. Each team will play 15 games at the Community Center.

Boys living in the following area are eligible for St. Matthews Little League:

Bounded on the south by Taylorsville Road; on the west by Bowman Field, Seneca Park, Crescent Hill Golf Course, and Mockingbird Road; on the north by the river; and on the east roughly by Dorsey Lane, Hounz Lane and Goose Creek Road.

And, consequently, it should be the most successful! Receipts from Booster Day go toward the operation—and expansion—of the Community Center, the area's largest recreational facility.

Getting underway about 4 p.m. Friday, Booster Day will continue, except for the two morning hours, through Saturday night. As usual, the annual affair will take place on the Community Center's 14 acres located just west of the east Drive-In Theatre and directly behind the Ten Pin bowling lanes. A huge searchlight will mark the spot.

Featuring a fish fry on Friday evening and the now-famous chicken bar-b-que on Saturday, Booster Day will also boast an inexhaustible supply

of cotton candy, peanuts and popcorn; a number of children's rides, including ponies, flying airplanes and a ferris wheel; and a collection of valuable gifts. Topping the list is a portable automatic dishwasher.

To add to the fun, both the Babe Ruth and Little Leagues have scheduled games on both days of the event. Baseball diamonds of both leagues are located on the Community Center grounds.

So in all, the two-day event stacks up as the kind of fun most families are looking for. And as in the past, thousands of St. Matthews folks are expected to turn out to boost their Community Center while they enjoy a good time!

Booster Day is actually the joint effort of St. Matthews civic clubs, fraternal organizations, scouts and merchants in behalf of the Community Center. Volunteer help from literally hundreds of people takes care of everything from ticket-taking, to cooking chicken, serving the fish, and policing the grounds.

Community Center officials are hoping that Booster Day this year will net in excess of \$4,000 so that a hard-surfaced tennis court can be added to the Center's long list of recreational facilities already in place.

Booster Day brings Center about \$4,100

Booster Day netted the St. Matthews Community Center about \$4,100, according to treasurer Ray Steltenpohl. This is \$900 better than last year, and \$1,500 better than in 1957.

This includes the approximately \$1,000 made from the Saturday affair plus proceeds from the ticket sales and the Baseball March. The March yielded \$2,250.

A deluge of rain and hail nearly scuttled the affair last weekend. The popular and profitable Friday night fish fry was driven indoors, and booth and ride income fell off as wet grounds and threatening weather kept many people away.

Dave McCandless, Community Center president, estimated the bad weather "cut our first night crowd in half." The \$4,100 represents about 75 per cent of the Center's 1958 operating expenses.

As usual, the most popular item at Booster Day was the St. Matthews Rotary Club's Chicken Bar-B-Que. Some 800 chicken dinners were sold. The Little League Auxiliary served up about 150 pounds of fish on Friday night at their "under-water" fish fry.

Mr. McCandless had nothing but praise for the many volunteers representing local merchants, civic clubs, fraternal organizations, boy scouts, baseball leagues, and others who made Booster Day possible. "They all worked terrifically hard in weather that was pretty wet, then awfully hot and humid, the Community Center is mighty grateful for their efforts."

Mr. McCandless said it "was a shame these people have to work so hard and give up so much of their time to realize only \$1,000

or to . . . but we are in need of every cent we can get and they can take some satisfaction in knowing that all the money will be put to very good use."

He now has 28 strikeouts to his credit in two games. On May 30, he struck out 12 Lions. On Saturday, he struck out 16 Showers. He gave up six walks Saturday; against the Lions he gave up one.

When not pitching, he plays centerfield, and was centerfielder for last year's National League All-Star team.

Porter no-hitter brings victory, but not for him

Entering its seventh year here, St. Matthews Little League Baseball Saturday had its gaudiest and most promising opening day yet.

Hundreds of cars and other vehicles carrying a crowd estimated in the thousands turned out for an hour-long parade, and a half-hour opening ceremony.

There was a solemn note as Rev. E. A. Wahl said the opening prayer; a reverent note as American Legion Zachary Taylor Post Commander Columb Price presented the American flag; and a moment of pride as manager Jim Heim and his assistant, Ed Butler, stepped forward to receive the State championship flag won by St. Matthews last year.

Louisville Colonels general manager Lynn Stone, WAVE's Ed Kalky, and St. Matthews Mayor Bernie Bowling spoke a few words. Carl Markert and his Waggoner High band entertained the crowd with some cheery music. William McConnell is league president.

The games got underway at about 11 o'clock under a hot, overcast sky, and the crowd was astounded at the spectacle of a pitcher pitching a no-hit game and not getting credit for the victory.

Little Bobby Porter, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Porter, of 495 Kinglan, held the Dairy Queen team hitless and runless for six innings. Little League rules forbade him to pitch any more.

The game was 0-0. John's Pendergrass Chevrolet teammates had been unable to score off Joe Lenahan, who also was lifted after six innings.

Danny Reid took over from Joe in the seventh. Pitching wildly, he hit two men and walked one and was promptly relieved by Larry Harper, who walked in the winning run.

Benny Kibler, who pitched the seventh for Pendergrass, got credit for the victory. Benny didn't allow a hit, either.

Bobby, now in his fourth Little League year, must have been disappointed at not getting credit for the win, but later he said it was all right, just so long as his team finally did win.

Up to now he has been noted for his hitting, rather than pitching ability. Playing center field when not on the mound, he batted .363 for Pendergrass last year, and had a poor pitching record of one win, two losses.

He did, however, get credit for the St. Matthews American All-Star 16-7 victory over Glasgow last year, a game that helped the local boys to get the State title.

Rahiya's one-hitter gives Cubs pennant

Cub right hander John Rahiya fired a beautiful one hit 1-0 shutout at the Giants Saturday night, to hand his team the St. Matthews Babe Ruth League pennant.

Rahiya, a lanky 15-year-old who compiled a 4-1 record for the season, was in complete command all the way. He had a no-hitter for six innings until Randy Phillips singled to lead off the last round. He allowed only three men to reach second base, and only one, Cary Shade in the second, reached third.

He walked two and struck out seven, using only 72 pitches for the seven innings.

Overshadowed by Rahiya's fine job, was Giant sopthpaw Bow McConnell's pitching artistry. The stocky lefty allowed only three hits and struck out eight. However his erratic control kept him in hot water a good part of the game. In fact, a base on balls cost him the ball game.

* * *

He gave up all the runs the Cubs needed in the first inning, when he walked lead-off man Mike Patrick, then an out later passed Steve Youngblood, moving Patrick to second. Cleanup man Corky Bales then smacked his

first offering for a single, scoring Patrick.

The victory put the pennant out of the reach of the second place Tigers. The Cubs record now reads 11-3, while the Tigers are 8-6. Thus, even if the Tigers should win their last two games and the Cubs lose theirs, the Cubs would still have a one-game lead.

The Cubs were managed by Mr. Walter Bales, of 219 Hillcrest, who will be the National League All-Star manager.

This year's All-Star games will be played on July 28 and 29 at the St. Matthews Community Center, League President W. T. Porter announced last week. On July 28, Camp Taylor will engage South End in the 6 o'clock game, while the St. Matthews American and National League teams will clash in the afterpiece. There will be a consolation game for the losers July 29 at 6 p.m. and the championship game will conclude things at 8.

Little League: But the biggest sports organization here is St. Matthews Little League Baseball for boys 9 to 12, Organized in 1953, it now has 16. The original plans were for four teams, but so many boys showed up on the first day, that a minor league as well as a major league was begun. Eight St. Matthews firms agreed to sponsor teams, and Sander's Cleaners agreed (and still does) to clean uniforms free.

A regulation ball park with dugouts stands, and press box was erected on the Community Center playground in 1953. The first season opened on June 7 that year, with each team play-ing 18 games.

The first-year pennant went to the Lions in one league, and the Models in the other. In 1954, the Colonials, spurred on Mike Lawson beat the Taylors for American League Pennant, The Citizens won easily in the National League, sparked by Dick Peloff and Gerry Kazunas. The Americans won the District Championship in 1954.

The National League All-Stars were good enough to get to the State Tournament and win their first game, before bowing to Paducah. The Ermann's won the National pennant in 1955, and the Models took the American League pennant.

The Models again captured the American League pennant in, 1956, and the Lions won the National League with a record of 15-2-1. The American League All-Stars captured the district title in 1956 also. A second diamond was built at the Center that year. Charles Siegel president since 1953 stepped down in 1956 to be succeeded by Harold Hammon.

In 1957, the Little League was enlarged to four leagues of four teams each. The Thurston Cooke team captured the International League Championship. The Lions again took the National League pennant in 1957, and the Models the American League for the third straight year. The Models again took the pennant in 1958, and Ashbury Berman took the National League. Jim Helm was the outstanding pitcher of the American League, and Barney Neal the outstanding pitcher of the National League. The American All-Star team copped the State title in baseball in 1958. The team then went to Maryland for the Divisional tournament but lost to Brooklyn Park in the first round.

William McConnell was elected president of the Little League in 1958, and a second minor league of four teams, with 15 boys per team, was organized.

Babe Ruth League: The Babe Ruth League was first established as the Pony League for boys from 12 to 15 in 1954. There were four teams of 16 boys each. Each team played 16 games, with the Yanks taking the first pennant. The Pony League All-Stars, sparked by pitcher Bobby Marr, won the Eastern Kentucky Championship, but lost the State Championship.

In 1955, the name was changed to Babe Ruth League, with the Cubs Winning the first Babe Ruth pennant. The American All-Stars barely defeated the National All-Stars in 1956. Bobby Marr was named the out-standing player for the year 1956. The 1957 champions were the Indians, and the Tigers copped the 1958 pennant. John Thompson was the outstanding pitcher in 1958. W. T. Porter is league president.

The American Legion League was established in 1957 for 16-and-older boys. The Zachary Taylor Reds won the pennant in 1957, spurred on by Bobby Marr.

The team went to the state finals in 1957 before losing. They won the state title in 1956 and got a trip to the Regionals in North Carolina but lost in the first round.

Football for youngsters: The St. Matthews Football League was established in 1954. In the Junior Division, the Bears have had a monopoly, winning every year since 1955. In the Senior Division for boys 13-15, the honors have been split between the Trojans and the Eagles. The Junior Division is for eight to 12 year-olds.

Little League races are over; Lions, Pendergrass win titles

Lion's Club erupted for three runs in the bottom of the fourth inning Saturday afternoon at the Community Center to down Lincoln Income 4-2 clinching the Little League National pennant. In the American League, Pendergrass waltzed in with the league crown on the strength of Benny Kibler's two hit pitching, turning back Dairy Queen 6-3.

Little righthander Tony Belluci survived a rocky first inning to set the hard hitting Lincoln team down with only four hits the rest of the way. Three of these went to catcher Steve Simpson. Lanky right hander Hutch Riley started for Lincoln, and absorbed the loss.

In the first inning, Lincoln's John Hartwell led off the game with a walk, and went to second

on a passed ball. After Holzheimer struck out Simpson singled to left field, plating Hartwell. Itley then lived on an error by the shortstop, and Hal Bryan singled to center. However, Lion's Ed Green threw Simpson out at the plate. Lovelace then grounded out, ending the inning.

The Lions tied it up in the second when pitcher Belluci led off with a home run over the center field wall. Riley bore down though and retired the side without further damage.

The Lions grabbed the pennant by pushing across three big runs in the fourth. Buddy Morris led off with a walk, and Ron Porter followed an out later with a single to right. Russ Ogden sacrificed both men up and Schoenbachler walked to load the sacks.

Morris raced home on a wild pitch, and when Simpson's throw got past Riley covering. Porter scooted all the way around from second to make the score 3-1. Doug Roederer then sliced a single to right chasing Schoenbachler home and sewing up the pennant.

Lincoln made a valiant attempt to get back into the game in the fifth, loading the bases with only one out. However, they got only one run, that when Stan Schuster walked to force in Itley. Belluci then got Chuck Rader to ground to first, retiring the side.

No less sensational than Belluci's job was that done by Ben-

ny Kibler of Pendergrass, who fired a two-hitter, struck out 10, and walked only one.

One of the two hits, though, was a fourth inning homer by losing pitcher Joe Lenahan, which accounted for all three Dairy Queen runs.

Pendergrass built up a six-run lead in the first three innings, though, and it proved too much for Dairy Queen to overcome.

With one out in the first, Charlie Butler doubled, and came around when Jim Raque singled.

They came right back for three more in the second as John Ward led off with a single, and Don Honour followed with a double. An out later, Jim Schroering walked to load the bases. Butler promptly singled. Ward and Honour, and Porter added Schroering with another single, making the score 4-0.

In the third, Nichols singled with two out, and Schroering followed with a walk. They both came around on Butler's third straight hit, to complete Pendergrass's scoring.

Lenahan then hit his homer in the fourth, but his teammates could do nothing further with Kibler's offerings.

On the completion of the Little League All-Star games, which begin Thursday, the winners of the two leagues, Lions and Pendergrass, will meet for the St. Matthews Little League World Series.

National All-Stars whip Americans 4-1

St. Matthews National League All-Stars rode the strong right arm of Butch Riley to a 4-1 victory over the American League Stars Tuesday evening at the St. Matthews field in the finals of the first round of the Little League Tournament.

The victory gave the Nationals the right to advance to the "Village" for the next step in the progression they hope will end in Williamsburg, Pa., for the Little League World Series.

Riley, a tall, lanky right-hander with a blazing fast ball, made only one bad pitch in the game, that being his first pitch of the game. The offering went to little Dave Catrol who promptly sent it soaring over the scoreboard in center field.

However, he was never in trouble after that until the last inning when two walks got him in a little hot water.

After losing pitcher Benny Kibler had gotten through the first two innings unscathed, the Nationals touched him for two in the third to go ahead 2-1. With two out, Russ Ogden hit a blooper which the shortstop couldn't

hang onto, and Reed Silliman hit a grounder which was bobbled by the third baseman. Mike Simpson then drew an intentional pass, loading the bases. Bill Pace then plated two runs with a sharp single to center.

The Nationals picked up two more in the fifth to put the damper on the Americans' hopes. Silliman led off with a double to left-center and Simpson walked. Riley then hit a low liner to center which the center fielder put his glove on, but could not hold, and both men scored.

Trying vainly to get back in the game, the Americans produced their most serious threat in the last inning, when two walks put men on first and second with only one out. However, Riley bore down to strike out Kibler and retire Bob Porter on a grounder to first.

St. Matthews wins district

Go to State at Bowling Green, Germantown fans were poor sports

The St. Matthews National League All-Stars turned a deaf ear to the shouts of an ominous Germantown crowd and captured the Little League district championship by defeating Germantown 6-0, at Ft.-Knox Saturday evening.

By winning, the National's gave St. Matthews its second straight district crown, and its third in four years. St. Matthews earned the right to advance to the State Tournament at Bowling Green, which starts Friday.

In one of the worst exhibitions of sportsmanship ever seen on a Little League field in this area, Germantown fans added a good deal of "color" to the game between St. Matthews and Germantown. The Germantown fans made a particular point of booing as loud as possible the St. Matthews boys as each individual approached the plate; they became vehement, at times even vulgar, in their disputing of the umpire's calls. In general they made the game a farce, and lowered themselves to the level of irresponsible soreheads.

Lanky Butch Riley fired a beautiful one-hit shutout at the

Germantown boys, the only hit being an opposite field single by Dale Cashon in the third inning.

For Riley, it was his second straight one-hitter in tournament play, and meant that he had given up only one run in 14 innings.

Riley was in trouble only twice in the game, once in the third, and again in the sixth.

In the third for Germantown, Rudy Thompson walked and Cashon got his single with one out, putting men on first and second. Riley slammed the door, however, striking out George Brenzel and Frank Banta.

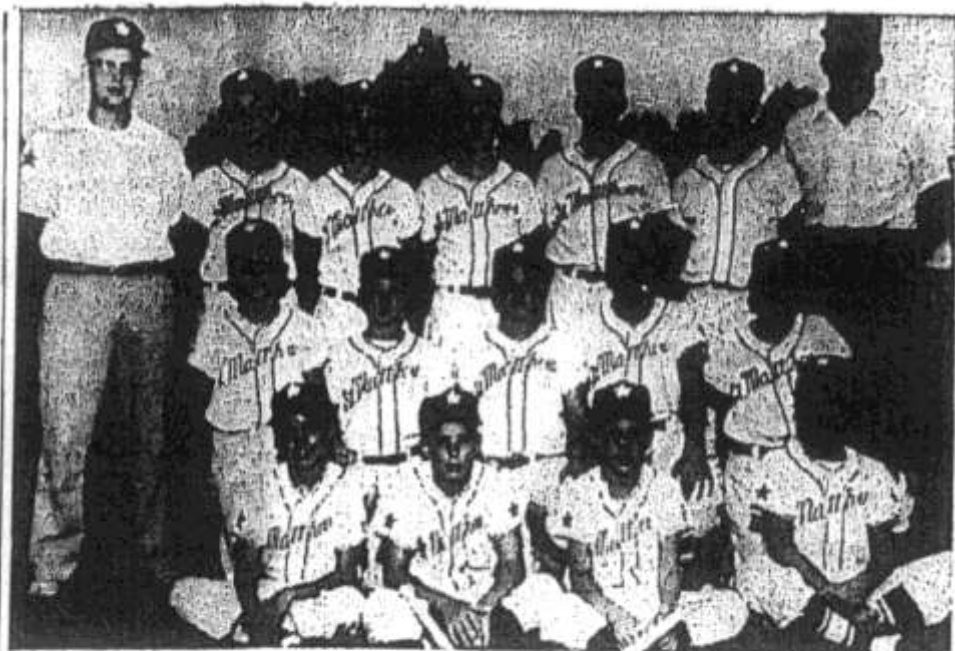

St. Matthews wins State Babe Ruth title in wild, weird game

In one of the wildest and wierdest games ever played, St. Matthews earned the right to go to Ypsilanti, Michigan for the Midwest Regional Babe Ruth Baseball tourney, defeating Owensboro 13-14 for the State title.

The "game" saw a boy start in center field, come in to pitch, go back to center field, then return to the mound again later in the game to become the winning pitcher; a team got what they thought was the final out of the game, only to find out that time had been called before the

pitch making it invalid; a team came from behind to tie the score, first in the seventh, trailing by two runs, then again in the eighth, trailing by four runs, then finally won in the ninth, after going into the inning trailing by one.

Jim Shollenberger was the boy who pitched twice, and played center in between mound stints. He came on in the fourth to replace starter Mount Davis, experienced little success, and returned to center field in favor of Carl Kuzlin.

He returned in the eighth inning, relieving Tom Ryan, and finding himself with the bases loaded, nobody out, and two balls on the batter. He finished the walk, got the next batter to hit into a double play, only to have Dave Watkins smash a tremendous home run. This time he managed to hang on through and was still on the mound the last inning.

Owensboro was the team who thought they had won, but found time to be out when the final pitch was delivered. In the eighth, with Weezy Townes at the plate for St. Matthews, pitcher Joe Krue fired a high inside fast ball which hit Townes' hat and bounced to the first baseman for what appeared to be the final out of the game.

Fans and players swarmed on to the field to congratulate the Owensboro team, but were quickly ushered off when the third base umpire announced he had called time before the pitch, and the game was not over. The next pitch was inside, walking Townes and forcing in a run. Tom Ryan then delivered a double to push across two more runs, and complete a four-run St. Matthews comeback.

The team which finally won the five hour marathon by rallying for two runs in the bottom of the ninth to erase a one-run Owensboro lead, was St. Matthews. They tied it on successive walks to Merle and Krue, and two score by Shollenberger and Tucker following a strikeout. The winning run came in one pitch after Tucker walked, as Townes got an arm in the way of a fast ball to force in the clincher.

The game, if you could call it that, saw 33 walks issued, 30 by Owensboro, six errors, eight hit batsmen seven by St. Matthews, and 20 strikeouts, 13 by Owensboro.

St. Matthews lost but it was a great experience for the boys

After running through five games, four of which were decided by two or fewer runs, the State champion St. Matthews American League Babe Ruth All-Stars finally came to the end of the road last Saturday, bowing to Wisconsin in the finals of the Ohio Valley Regional tournament, 3-2.

To this correspondent, who was privileged to be one of the players on the team, the tournament was rewarding in every way. To Tommy Dudgeon, who threw one bad pitch after pitching a beautiful game in relief, the feeling may be different. Certainly no one on the team or in the stands blamed Tom. It was just one of those things.

There is no doubt that every player on the team profited by the experiences they had while in the tournament. Every one connected with the tournament was more than courteous, and every player was shown the greatest possible consideration.

We were housed while in Ypsilanti in one of the new dormitories at Eastern Michigan University, which also provided the playing field. The accommodations were perfect in every detail.

The rooms were immaculately clean, the beds were comfortable. We were given very good meals each day at a pre-arranged time by the Hotel Huron in Ypsilanti. Certainly the town made a good impression on each of the players, not only of St. Matthews, but also of the other teams in the tournament.

With the exception of three of the players who left Wednesday with manager Howard Camnitz, the team left St. Matthews Thursday morning. It was an enjoyable seven to eight-hour drive to Ypsilanti, marked by innumerable lakes and ponds along the roadside. I rode the trip with Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Krueger and their son, Merle, and we all enjoyed ourselves.

Upon arrival in Ypsilanti that afternoon, we went to the ball park to watch the other teams engage in first round action. (St. Matthews drew a bye). After the games were over we went to the dorms, were assigned to

our rooms, and went about unpacking and cleaning up.

After dinner that night, some of the players took in a movie, while others returned to the dorms to play poker or watch television. At 10:30, Mr. Camnitz, and Mr. Jim Helgen broke up the poker games, ushered players out of the television room, and rounded up the rest from the movies, ordering all to hit the sack. Grudgingly this was done.

Friday morning we ate breakfast at 10, trying to stuff in enough to hold us till after the game, which was to start at 2. About 12:30, a host came to take us to a practice field, where we were given a couple rounds of batting practice. After that we proceeded to the field for our first game against Illinois.

Kenny Lewis, a big right-hander who won three games in the tournament, took the rubber for St. Matthews, and fought his way out of trouble all through the game to come off with a 1-0 victory. He struck out 10 but walked 5, and the walks kept him in hot water all afternoon.

All of us had some anxious moments. St. Matthews only got one hit, a bunt by yours truly, and that didn't figure in the scoring.

The only run came in the sixth, when Mount Davis led off, living on the shortstop's error, then came all the way around when Lewis laid down a sacrifice bunt. The Illinois pitcher fielded the ball and threw to first to get Lewis. However, Davis kept right on going around second, and came all the way home when there was nobody at third to receive the first baseman's throw.

Following orders by the managers, we spent a quiet evening in the dorms again Friday night, and went through the same routine Saturday. Breakfast at 10, batting practice, and then the game.

It was sunshiny and hot when we first stepped on the field to do battle with Wisconsin for the right to go to California for the finals. However, it quickly clouded up, and the clouds hung like an omen for St. Matthews.

Left-hander Mount Davis took over the pitching chores for us,

but just didn't have it. I matched Wisconsin's Ben Bouquet's goose eggs for two innings but in the third his control let him, and Dudgeon came on.

Tommy inherited a pitcher "dream" situation, arriving at the mound with the bases loaded, nobody out, and two balls on the batter. He retired the first batter on a pop-up, then got a 3-2 count on the next one, before walking him on a very close pitch, forcing in the first run of the ball game. He really bled down then, and methodically struck out the next two batters.

Just as we did in almost every game, however, we came back to tie the game up in the fourth. Merle Krueger, Tom Ryan and myself drew successive walks, then after Doug Finnegan lined a hard drive to left which the left-fielder made fine play on, Bobby Meccia laid down a perfect squeeze bunt scoring Krueger with the tying run.

Dudgeon was the victim of errors in the bottom of the fourth, and Wisconsin got another run.

We were right back in the sixth, though, to tie it up once more. Krueger again walked to lead off the inning, then two straight singles by Doug Finnegan and I brought him home with another tying run.

In the bottom of the sixth, however, Wisconsin came up with another one on Bruce Emberson's 310-foot home run over my head in center. The homer came after two were out, and Tom had gotten two strikes on Emberson.

We got a man on second in the seventh, but couldn't get him across this time, and it was all over.

The tournament came to a close, I understand, with a banquet for the winners. Some of the St. Matthews players stayed the last night, but most of them headed for home. A little disappointed, but confident that they did as well as they could, and certain that no one could ask for more. They had gone farther than any other St. Matthews Babe Ruth team, and had nothing to be ashamed of.

Community Center wants tennis courts

Will help take care of girls' recreation; cost will be \$8,000

The St. Matthews Community Center is taking care of the recreational needs of boys pretty well, but the girls have been neglected.

Center president David C. McCandless this week said the "program for the young ladies of our communities is very inadequate."

He promptly announced the board of directors is seeking ways to finance the construction of two tennis courts on the Center's 14-acre playground.

The cost will be \$8,000. The Center already has \$3,000. He called upon the churches, civic clubs, business and professional people, and private individuals here to contribute the remaining \$5,000.

In a letter Tuesday he said:

"We have just completed one of the most successful summer seasons ever conducted. The Community Center picnic area and wading pool cannot be surpassed in Jefferson County. The picnic area is well-shaded, well-kept, and has nice picnic tables and grilles. The wading pool has provided thousands of children many refreshing hours of pleasure during the hot summer months.

"The arts and craft classes conducted by Mrs. Dehart reached a new high in participation and accomplishment. The playground equipment was painted in bright colors and was very appealing to the youngsters. The baseball clubs, for which we provide the grounds and current, have again brought national prominence to St. Matthews. Little League football has enjoyed its most successful season.

"On some 14 acres of ground leased by the Center, a program for the young ladies of our communities is very inadequate. In

order to alleviate this deficiency, the Board of Directors are seeking ways to finance two tennis courts at an approximate cost of \$8000. The Center has approximately \$3000 to be used in this endeavor.

"Because of the tremendous heat loss caused by the continuous opening of the front doors of the Community Center building, the board of directors has appropriated \$750 for the erection of a foyer approximately 12 foot by 16 foot to be used as a check room and lounge. The Business and Professional Women's Club of St. Matthews has contributed \$50 toward the erection of this building.

"The Community Center receives no tax monies whatsoever. The operating funds are raised through the Booster Day Festival in June, Civic Clubs, Baseball March, and gifts of churches and civic-minded individuals.

"We are appealing now to the whole St. Matthews area—churches, civic clubs, business and professional people, private individuals—to help us keep at the same level the recreation program of which we can all be proud to be a part. Much could be accomplished, for the average income in this area is higher than in any other community in the Falls Cities area.

"Remember the Community Center is operated for the benefit of all the residents in the St. Matthews area. Please give us your support.

New president calls for larger season, and new diamond or lights

A longer playing season and either a new diamond or lights for one of the present fields at the Community Center may be in store for St. Matthews Little League baseball next summer.

Frank Hartley, new Little League president, said today that consideration of extra playing dates and new facilities are the first items of business which will be placed before the officers and board of directors for 1960.

"I don't feel that a 15-game season is sufficient," Mr. Hartley said. "I intend to push for 20 games with the season starting about the middle of May and ending about the third week in July."

The St. Matthews Little League, Inc., has two major leagues of six teams each and two minor leagues, each having four teams. Last summer the league play started on Memorial Day and ran to the middle of July, after which the major league All-Star teams took over.

Mr. Hartley believes that by advancing the season two weeks forward into May and by finishing a week later, the St. Matthews area will be able to turn out better players in coming years than the already topnotch Little League graduates of recent seasons.

"A boy doesn't get enough chance to learn much baseball in 15 games—even if he gets to play in all of his team's games," Mr. Hartley said.

The Center now has plans to have Santa Claus pay a visit to the Center grounds Saturday, Dec. 19, at 2 p.m. Santa will pass out oranges and candy, and he will listen to last-minute requests by the children.
