

The mayor said he is hopeful federal funds can be obtained to help purchase the park. Such funds could be beid in escrow until local money


in escrow until local money matching the federal grant is obtained, the mayor said. The federal funds may be available under the Open Space Program, An application for the funds is to be filed soon.





ship, defeating Seneca 29 - 18, . . Three events that epitomize three kinds of east - end sports programs, summer baseball, AAU competition, and high school athletic programs.

From small beginnings these three programs now are respected.

Summer baseball for youngsters began in

1953 with the founding of the St. Matthews Little League by Charles Siegel, and in 1955 a Babe Ruth League was formed.

1955 a Babe Run League was formed. Although both the Little League and Babe Ruth League had won state championahips, never had a team competed in a World Series. The 1968 Babe Ruth team illustrated the quality of both leagues -- almost every boy on the Babe Ruth squad learned the sport well while playing little league at the St. Matthews Community Center Park.

Over the past decade east-end boys and girls have excelled in swimming and diving. AAU and high school, with Plantation Country Club dominating state and region swimming, and Westport, Trinity, and Sacred winning state championehipafter championshin.

With Trinity's victory in the AAA football championship, east-end high school sports reached a new peak. It was the first state football title as well as the first state championship in a major sport for the east-end.

In the past five years girls' sports programs have developed rapidly in the state and in the east-end,

This year the Eastern girls' track team captured the state title, edging out Male, it was the cast-end's first state track championship, although both Eastern and Trinity have been state powerhouses in the sport -- and have come close to taking the boys' state title.

Next month the first sports national championship will be held in the east-end; The National Men's and Women's Swimming and Diving Championship at Plantation Country Club.

Founding of Little League in St. Matthews recalled

early 30%, in 1962, a group of St. Matthews area cifizens was looking for a recreation program for the youth of the com-manity. After a caroful analysis of the ideas and objectives of Little League. It was agreed that this would be an ideal project to undertake.

Early in 1953 the program began to shape up. Officers were elected, They were: Charles Stegel, president; Don Numits, vice-president; Jack Brocks, secretary, and Hunter Look, treasur-67.

These men started to work immediate-These men started to work immediate-ly. They were able to arouse enough pub-lic interest to call a sizeable meeting, the result being that not one, but two leagues would be necessary to accomo-date the number of boys who were in-terested. And so, the St. Matthews A-merican and National Leagues were been. bagen.

The first -- and most important -- obstacle to be overcome was the problem of money. It was estimated that at least \$4,000 would be needed to get the project underway, Henry Showers and Hun-ter Look took it on themselves to meet this problem head-on. They set out im-mediately to interest eight businesses in sponsoring a team of their own -- for a "cust*' of \$275 each.

With the help of Heien Zeinder, Hay Marrilla and Charle Meyers, the ac-quistion of a field sile was relatively simple. Since these people were officorn of the St. Matthews Community Center, Little League, through them, was given permission to use its present incatton,

The actual building of a hall such remained the big problem, and the small group of officials began to inoh for help along the lines of construction and field layout.

Numerous suggestions as to how build the ball park were received but little material help was forthcoming. The

> Specific request for waterial help would he made at this meeting. The meeting wis held and to a great extent it was the most successful yet. Several men agreed to donate such items as dirt and excavating and road equipment, Little League will always be indebted to Bud Andrint, E. F. Singler, and William Dohram who donated time and equipment to the construction of the park.

Charlie Hueff volunteered to do the sign work on the park feaces.

A building committee was appointed and A building committee was appointed that encouraged to contact every available source for materials. The committee got 100 per cent support from the St. Mat-thews area, and before long Chet Ruck-er, head of the committee, had materials necessary to complete the park.

In addition, neveral civic-minded persons made generous contributions toward the construction of the park.

While construction was underway, league officials were busy organizing details in connection with the actual playing of the games. Selection of managors, player agents, umpires, scorekeepers, procedures to register boys - all had to be worked out before the program could get underway,






