With this remark Thomas M. Wilder, chairman of the drive to raise funds for the depart-ment, opened a meeting of the fund-raising committee Toesday night at the home of Paul Hession, Hillereek Road, after totalling pledges and checks turned in at the meeting.

He reported membership contributions exceeded \$10,000 and with the \$4,300 the County will add to this on a matching basis, "we've got nearly \$15,000 of the \$23,000 to \$25,000 we need to erect, furnish, equip, and man our fire department," he said. Contributions of \$300 each

were reported from Bauer's and Cape Codder Restaurants, and from the Hikes Point Bowling

The fire committee thanked Mr. McMahan and unanimously agreed to accept his offer. The donation ended a two-month search by the committee for a suitable site.

Committee Chairman Thomas Wilder introduced Mr. McMahan to the group, meeting at the home of Charles Bowlds, 16 Canterbury Drive.

The committee will enlist the services of County fire co-ordinator Daniel Boone in transfer- 1 ring the title to the land.

Chairman Thomas Wilder unnounced last week that the articles of incorporation of the new Mc-Mahan Volunteer Fire Department have been accepted by the state.

The Fire Department as incorporated will be headed by a board of seven directors. Three are to be elected from the contributing residents, three from the Volunteer Firemen and one from either of the two groups.

Those men living in the area to be served, who wish to volunteer as firemen are urged to do so immediately by contacting Mr. Wilder at CH. 2580, so that candidates for the election of board members may be nominated in the near future.

It is planned that all persons contributing to the Fire Department will be notified of those candidates so that voting may be done June 21 at 8 p.m. at the home of Charles Bowlds, 20 Canterbury Drive.

Fire Rates Are Halved

Fire insurance rates in the Hikes Point area have been cut in half, effective immediately, thanks to the McMahan Center Volunteer Fire Department.

Thomas M. Wilder, chairman of the Fire Department's Board, announced this week he has received a bulletin sent by the Kentucky Inspection Bureau's director, A. Clements, to all fire underwriters.

The bulletin announced the area now has a seventh class rating. This means that homeowners must pay only 37 cents per \$100 annually for fire and extended coverage on their homes. Previously, the area had a 10th class rating, and paid 75 cents per \$100.

The new rating covers property within three driving miles of the Fire Department, located at Hikes Point. That includes about 1,000 residences. Total savings for all the people in that area is an estimated \$50,000 annually in insurance rates, or about \$50 per home.

On straight fire coverage, the savings are even more significant, for the tenth class rate is 62 cents, and the seventh class rate 24 cents.

The Fire Department opened last month. The firehouse plus the J 500-gallon fire engine cost about 525,000.

County Volunteer firemen, addressed the Board of Trustees of the City of St. Regis Park regarding their concerns for fire protection, as their men, addressed the Board of Trustees of the City of St. Regis Park regarding their concerns for fire protection, as their men, addressed the Board of Trustees of the City of St. Regis Park regarding their concerns for fire protection, as their City was outside the 3 mile limits of existing fire stations at Lyndon, St. Matthews and Jeffersontown. He proposed that financial assistance for a Fire Department would be solicited from the County and the 5 small cities within the proposed protection area. He estimated the cost for this service to be \$17 the first year per home owner and \$5 there after. He proposed that these costs would more than be made up in a savings of at least \$38 per year on fire insur-ance for each home owner. He proposed that the Fire Department would be owned and manned by the Jeffersontown Volunteer Fire Department and that it would be up and running by July 1st of 1955. Finally, he proposed a town meeting to be held at the Melbourne Heights School to determine if the residents of this community were truly interested in forming a Fire Depart-

On March 22, 1955, a meeting was held at the Melbourne Heights School to consider a fire station for the 1000+ families in the eastern part of Jefferson County, Kentucky known as Hikes Point. It was estimated that \$25,000 would need to be raised to start the Fire Department. Before the end of the meeting over \$7,000 was pledged and a Fire Department was born, the Hikes Point Volunteer Fire Department. The Fire Department was to be funded by donations and \$25.00 subscriptions from property owners. Daniel Boone, the Director of the Jefferson County Fire Program estimated that residents would save up to 65% on their insurance programs with the proposed new fire station.

Jefferson County Government was solicited in hopes of obtaining some free property on Taylorsville Road for the sta-tion. In May of 1955, Roy F. McMahan Sr., donated a lot near his proposed shopping center and the Hikes Point Bowling Lanes on Hunsinger Lane, for the fire station. In return for the donation and due to the close proximity of the fire station to his proposed shopping center, the Fire Department was named McMahan Center Volunteer Fire Department. Building plans were drawn up and a contract was awarded to Wilson Stoess Company to construct the 30 foot by 60 foot building for a total cost of \$11, 875.00. The new fire station included space for 2 fire trucks, a kitchen, 2 bathrooms, and an equipment storage room. Larry Burnett of Bryant-Burnett Heating, and a trustee with the City of St. Regis Park, provided the heating system for the lire station gratis. This was just one of the many donations that were received from civic minded persons and firms. Today, the fire station at 3018 Hunsinger Lane is utilized as a storage a building by the McMahan Group.

As of July 1, 1955, over \$13,500 had been committed to the new Fire Department. The target date for the new equip-ment to arrive was September 1, 1955, and the scheduled completion date of the new fire station was October 1, 1955. John S. Westerman of Houston Acres was Selected as the first Fire Chief.

The first new fire engine was scheduled to arrive on January 21, 1956. By that time, the building had been completed, the hose and equipment had been delivered, and the house siren had been installed. Volunteer fire fighters were eagerly awaiting the arrival of the new fire engine to start their training process. McMahan Center Volunteer Fire Department officially went into service on February 1, 1956, after receiving their official rating as a Fire Department on January 21, 1956.

On March 3, 1956, an open house was scheduled to give the public an opportunity to inspect the new fire station, truck and equipment. County Judge Bertram Van Arsdale made the dedication. Along with the open house, a raffle was held for a 1956 Pontiac and a 1956 24" Motorola TV, with the proceeds of the \$5 chances being uti-lized to purchase additional equipment and protective clothing.

Twenty-two additional volunteer tire fighters signed up for the Tuesday evening training sessions which began on March 5, 1956. These volunteers were required to obtain 20 hours of training before they could actually go into service.

July 1956, brought the first fund raising effort. "Fun-0-Rama" ran from July 10th to the 15th. With a carnival type atmosphere including Ferris wheels, merry-go-round, and horse rides, the Fire Department was trying to raise funds to pay off their mortgage of \$9,000 on their first fire engine. Various neighborhood organizations such as St. Regis Park and Lincolnshire worked such booths as the grocery booth, sportsman 2000th, and candy booth with ticket prices being 5 or 10 cents. This find raising effort netted the Fire Department over \$2,200.

By July of 1956, the area was already starting to develop, and according to Thomas Wilder, President of the Fire Department, consideration was being made to purchase another engine for \$18,000 as well as \$2,000 in additional necessary equipment.

In January of 1957, Chief Inspector, William Reinert, under the direction of Chief McGhee, established the first Fire Prevention Bureau in the nation in a volunteer Fire Department. All homes and business-es within their jurisdiction were inspected on a year round basis. The National Fire Protection Association conveyed an award to the Fire Department for their leadership in fire safety. Chief McGhee stated that "we have fine equipment and a nice shiny new truck, but nothing would make us happier than to never have to use it."

The original pumper was a 1956 Seagrave and was designated "Mac 1". The St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department provided an additional pumper for a dollar, a 1941 Ford, designated "Mac 2", to help the Fire Department get started. In 1959, a Ford/American pumper with a 1000 gallon water tank was purchased and designated "Mac 3". During this time period fire hydrants were few and far between and this "hydrant on wheels" proved to be very useful.

In 1962, a Ford/Sutphen Pumper was purchased to replace the original "Mac 2". This unit had a front mount pump that would allow it to pump and roll at the same time. Since the area was largely undeveloped, field fires were a major concern and this unit would allow the Fire Department to better handle them. Lillian H. Barth donated a set of hydraulic tools known as a "Porto-Power" to help the Fire Department with vehicle accidents. This unit is still in service as a parade piece and auxiliary pumper. In August of 1965, Chief James Wetherby proudly reported to the residents of the St. Regis Park that the Fire Department was one of 4 across the County that had achieved a Class 6 fire insurance rating. It was also during this time period that McMahan became one of the first Fire Departments to sign up for the new Central dispatch.

In 1966, Albert F. "Sam" Barth took over as Chief and set the standard for a one (1) minute response time that is still the standard today. His fellow firefighters alleged that he slept in his car or had a radio at his bed, because no one in the County could go "10-6" any quicker than he. His son, Paul could be seen riding with him on many of the fires, getting dressed as they traveled down the road.

It was during this time period that Louisville Fire Department contracted with Mc-Mahan for services. Fire run responses almost doubled over the next 3 years. Chief "Sam" Barth was known for his commit-ment and dedication. Funds were so tight that Chief Barth would take money out of his pocket to purchase equipment that was needed for the Fire Department. He purchased himself, the first portable Motorola hand held radio for the Department. He also had the only "dual channel" ten- ten portable monitor and could be seen carrying this one foot by one foot square box on his shoulder wherever he went so as not to miss a call. He never took a vacation and was proud of the fact that in 10 years, he never missed a fire run.

Chief Albert Barth took a short sabbatical from the Fire Department in 1970 but returned in 1976 to serve on the Board of Trustees, where he served as Chairman until his death in November of 1993.

In 1972, under the leadership of Chief Alvin Sutt, a Ford/Pirsch Quad was purchased to help protect the fast growing community and to replace the 1958 Ford/American pumper. The old "Mac 3" was sold to Ghent Fire Department in Ghent, Kentucky, Also in the early 1970's, the original fire station on Hunsinger Lane was remodeled to add office space and a large training room to help meet the needs of the quickly growing Fire Department and community.

1975 brought major changes to the Fire Department. The Fire Department became an independent taxing district and changed its name to McMahan Fire Protection District, to reflect this new finding source. A Holding Company was formed as well, that would allow the Fire District to borrow funds beyond their annual income. As the community grew and additional fire protection became necessary, this was a way of keeping up with the growth and preparing for the future.

In 1975, a Ford/Pirsch Telesqurt, a sister unit to the 1972 Ford!Pirsch Quad, was purchased to help keep up with the growing community needs. Unfortunately, the fire station on Hunsinger Lane would not house the new apparatus. The Hikes Point area was becoming increasingly busy with traffic and this was the opportunity to move away from this traffic congested area. Under the leadership of Chief Paul O'Leary, a site was chosen on Taylorsville Road and a new building was built. The new building was "state of the art" and included 3 apparatus bays, a large storage room, large training room, and additional office space. Unfortunately the building wasn't completed until after the delivery of the 1975 Ford/Pirsch Telesqurt. The Jeffersontown Fire Protection District gladly housed the unit until the fire station was completed. In May of 1975, the new build-ing was completed at a cost of \$352,000 and shortly thereafter, the 1956 Seagrave, "Mac I ", was sold. On August 4, 1975, the old fire station on Hunsinger Lane was sold for \$70,000 and the old house siren was sold to Pleasure Ridge Park Fire Dis-trict for their station #5, where it still sits today.

1977 marked the year that the Fire Dis-trict received their first powered, hydraulic rescue tools. From the assistance of many donations including the Meadow Heights Women's Club, and the Sterling Road Association, a complete set of Hurst "Jaws" was purchased by Chief O'Leary. A service van was converted to carry these along with other rescue and salvage tools. Under the leadership of Chief Larry Schweitzer, a 1978 Pirsch Pumper was purchased to both add to the fleet, and to modernize the apparatus. This was the first diesel apparatus for the Fire Department. This unit was sold to Dixie Suburban Fire District in 2004 and is still in use today as one of their front line pumpers. In 1979, the Insurance Services Office inspected the Fire District and awarded a class 4 insurance rating. McMahan was one of six (6) Fire Departments across the County with this high rating. In 1981, also under the leadership of Chief Larry Schweitzer, a Ford! Saulsbury rescue truck was purchased to carry the many tools that had previously been carried on a service van. Vehicle rescues were a major problem for the Fire District at that time, due to the ever increasing traffic flow in Hikes Point and Interstate 64. This unit had a front mount winch, on board generator, and many storage compartments. The unit was sold in 1986 to St. Matthews Fire Protection District for use as a command van and ambulance. It now resides at the Anchorage Fire Protection District where it is utilized as a Command and Mobile Radio Control Center for the entire city of Anchorage.

On August 1, 1983, a new era had begun, and the first career firefighters were hired. Chief Paul Barth was hired as the first career Fire Chief, with his responsibilities to administrate and oversee the operations of the Fire District on a full time basis. With the growing requests for public education programs and to keep up with the "explosion" of new construction, a Fire

Prevention/Public Education Offi-cer, Bill Renninger, was added to the ca-reer staff. Shortly thereafter in 1985, 2 additional career fire-fighters were added to help maintain the station and apparatus as well as perform maintenance duties. Chief Barth's philosophy was that "the volunteer firefighters time given to the Department should be spent on training and making fire run responses, not cleaning hose and fire apparatus".

In 1984, under the leadership of Chief Paul Barth, the Fire District received a Class 2 fire insurance rating by the Insurance Services Office. At the time, this Fire District was one of only two in Jefferson County receiving this high rating. This rating gave residents and businesses in our area, the cheapest fire insurance rates possible. This rating still holds true today, over 20 years later.

In 1986, in an effort to demonstrate how equipment and apparatus could be shared across the County along with true taxpayer savings, a Ford/Super Vacuum Air, Light, and Power Apparatus was purchased. This unit carries 72 spare air bottles, has a 6 bottle cascade system, an on-board air compressor and a 20,000 watt hydraulic generator. This apparatus is used throughout Jefferson County and from time to time responds outside Jefferson County and to many areas of Southern Indiana. The pur-chase of this unit has been the catalyst for other Fire Districts to purchase specialized equipment and apparatus to share. In 1986, a service van was purchased to replace the 1977 service van that was growing tired after being utilized as both a service vehicle, and a rescue vehicle. The 1977 service van was sold to St. Matthews Fire Protection District.

1987 brought even more changes to the Fire District. Under the direction of Chief Paul Barth, the fire station was remodeled to add bay space, more office space, additional storage space, and dormitories where 7 volunteer Fire-Fighters would live. With the addition of these new living quarters, the Fire District was able to provide a 1 minute response time 24 hours a day. This Fire Protection District was one of the first to try this new concept which today is the standard at most fire stations. 1987 also brought the addition of several more career Firefighters and a new Seagrave Pumper/Squrt. This unit was state of the art as far as fire suppression capabilities and firefighter safety. With a door completely enclosed cab and air conditioning, firefighters would travel in a safe environment to incident scenes. How many times while you were hanging off of the back of one of the older pumpers, did you look down at the pavement and pray that you didn't fall off? With 5 "quick lines" and a 1,000 gpm. nozzle elevated on a boom, this fire apparatus is equipped for the "big one".

In an effort to show unity of the County Fire Service as a whole and to work towards a common goal of a unified fire protection system across Jefferson County, the official name of the Fire District was changed to Jefferson County Fire Protection District 14 - McMahan and the Jefferson County Fire Service logo was adopted. This name reflects both our official taxing district number and the community we serve, yet shows unity to the other Fire Districts across the County.

In 1996, the Fire District still boasted a Class 2 fire insurance rating and was constantly working to try and improve that rating to become a Class 1. In fact, a 1996 rating by the insurance Services Offices put us within I or 2 points of being a Class 1 Department, of which there are only 2 in the entire United States. A 1994 Seagrave Pumper/Squirt which is a sister apparatus to the 1987 Seagrave Pumper/Squirt and a 1994 Seagrave 100' Aerial Ladder were purchased to replace two (2) apparatus that were retired from service. The 1994 Seagrave 100' Aerial Ladder is a mobile "tool box" carrying rescue, medical, and salvage equipment. The 100' ladder is available to reach the upper floors of the several high rise buildings within the District. Also in 1994, the Hurst hydraulic rescue tools were retired and 2 new sets of Holmatro powered hydraulic tools were purchased. Rescue tools are now carried on the first out pumper as well as the aerial ladder.

The 1972 Ford/Pirsch Quad was sold to Monroe Township Volunteer Fire Department in Henryville, Indiana where it serves as their front line pumper. The 1975 sister unit, the Ford/Pirsch Telesqurt was sold to Whitley City Volunteer Fire Department in Whitley City, Kentucky. It will serve as their only aerial device and primary pumper.

1994 brought the first night, career firefighter employed by the Fire District. Chief Paul Barth felt that someone should be at the fire station at all times. Additional career firefighters were hired bringing the total up to 6 full time and 1 part time. In September of 1994, the Fire District became involved in an E.M.T. -D and First Responder Program in conjunction with the Jefferson County Emergency Medical Services. The Fire District responds to all life threatening situations across our Fire District and in close proximity to the fire station. The front line apparatus are equipped with E.M.T. kits, oxygen kits, and other medical equipment to provide basic life support until the arrival of an ambulance. In addition, 2 defibrillators were rotated among the apparatus and staff cars to provide "jump starting" of a heart if necessary. In 1996, there were 18 E.M.T. - D's and 1 First Responder with several additional Firefighters currently in training. The new surname of McMah-an Fire & Rescue more clearly defined the services that the Fire District provides to its customers.

Also in 1994, a new personnel carrier was purchased to replace the 1986 service van. With the number of volunteer fire-fighters increasing and the current seating arrangements on the fire apparatus limiting our manpower to 6 per appara-tus, a supplemental vehicle was needed to transport fire-fighters. In 1995 a pick up truck was purchased for use as a medi-cal response vehicle and service unit. This unit was replaced in 1996 due to damages received from an accident. Also in 1996, 3 new Ford Crown Victoria command cars were purchased to replace the 1991 models. One of the 1991 vehicles was kept for use as a medical response vehicle and staff car.

Today (2005), the Fire District still boasts a Class 2 fire insurance rating. We have success-fully been able to continue this rating for well over 20 years. It has always been Chief Paul Barth's goal to achieve a Class I fire insurance rating, however, this may require a substantial increase in career staffing to achieve this goal. In October of 2004, the District took delivery of a 2004, 75 foot Seagrave Quint. This apparatus replaces the 1978 Pirsch pumper that had been in service for well over 20 years. The 1978 Pirsch pumper was sold to the Dixie Suburban Fire Protection District, and is being used as one of their front line ap-paratus.

In 2002, we paved the way for a closest station response program in the District's South Hurstbourne Parkway corridor. We established a program with the Jeffersontown Fire Protection District, whereas they would automatically respond a pumper along with our Department, on all structural responses in that area. With this response program, we can insure that the closest unit to the incident, is truly responding.

Due to changes in OSHA laws, we are now required to essentially have 2 full companies, or 8 firefighters on the scene, before we can start our fire-fighting operations. The addition of this mutual aid arrange-ment, insures that there is no time lapse in our ability to perform our job function.

In 2005, we expanded the program, and the Jeffersontown Fire Protection District now provides a pumper to all structural responses East of Breckenridge Lane. In a similar arrangement, the Buechel Fire Protection District provides a pumper on an automatic response, to the west side of Breckenridge Lane. Our entire Fire District is covered with an automatic mutual aid response for all structural responses. It is the District's hope that an agreement which has been in the works with the Louisville Division of Fire over the last several years, will be finalized by the end of 2005, which will allow us to further improve this pro-gram, as well as providing similar services to areas within the Louisville Division of Fire boundaries.

A similar "mutual aid" program for EMS responses is in the process of being developed which would allow for both the closest unit to respond to the incident, no matter what the jurisdiction is, as well as cross-boundary mutual aid assistance when the primary responder is not available.

The Fire District resisted until March of 2003, putting on 24/48 shift Fire Fighters. Since 1983 when the first employee was hired, the employees have always worked a standard 40 hour, Monday thru Friday work shift. Due to the increase in run vol-ume, and our needs to ensure a "one minute" response time, it became necessary to move some of the 40 hour personnel to a 24 hour shift work. This means that an employee will work a 24 hour shift at the fire station, then is off for 48 hours until the next shift.


Fortunately, Chief Paul Barth had the foresight to build a Dorm for firefighters in the fire station during renovations that occurred in 1987. For many years, only volunteer firefighters lived in the Dorm. Today, this facility is shared by both volunteer and career firefighters.





It was a gift of the Lyndon Community Club, which raised \$275 from member denations to buy it

The department also has a new oxygen-tankand-gas-mask device for a fire lighter to use to make his way into a smoke-filled area without being overcome. This device, which cost 8214, was given by the department's ladies auxiliary. The women held a spaghetti supper to raise the money.

Mrs. William Pierce, Auxiliary vice-president and wife of the department's chief, said the equipment was bought to prevent some possible future disaster.

"We got it before we needed it," she said.

Mrs. Pierce said the department would answer





Police Protection Asked





I am not informed and the records of the Jefferson County Court Clerk's Office, which I examined, do not disclose who acquired the interest of W. Jesse Ogden, deceased.



City To Fix St. Matthews Avenue, Or Get It Fixed

Accepts Fire Department Price; To Ask For Garbage Contract Bids

The City of St. Matthews is going to get St. Matthews Avenue fixed, or fix the damaged street itself. The Council Tuesday authorized city attorney Maxwell Brown to contact Sherman Wetherby, County road department supervisor for the First District, in a last effort to have the County fix the road.

Falling there, the City will go ahead and spend its own mency to repair the street.

The Council also agreed to accept an offer by the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department to furnish protection for the City in 1955 for \$8,000.

The Council also voted to request bids for City garbage colflection for the next year by March 1 and award the contract March B. The present garbage contract with Cris Pennington expires April 1.

Councilman Sam Rudy, also head of the board of public works, declared "you can't drive over St. Matthews Avenue." He said there were two large holes about a foot deep on the west side between Frankfort Avenue and Westport Road, and heavy traffic had won the road down to the reinforcements.

The Council said that Ordinance 12, 1953, had annexed to the west line of St. Matthews Avenue, Ordinance 5, 1954, proposed to annex a territory including the street, but was tied up by a remonstrance suit. The street was, therefore, the responsibility of the County, the Council declared.

"But if it's an emergency, let's ro ahead and fix it," said Mr. Brown. "We're proposing to annex it anyway."

"It won't cost much and it will be a service to the people of St. Matthews," said Councilman James Kemper. The block between Frankfort and Westport is a vital artery for St. Matthews traffic.

The fire department's figure was \$500 higher than St. Matthews planned to pay, but Councilman E. R. Grinstead said \$8,000 was the best price he could get. Negotiations have been going on several months.

The formal contract will be drawn up and passed at the next meeting, February 23. (This meeting was set back one day because of Washington's birthday). It provides for protection of about 1,700 homes, 142 apartments, and 85 pieces of commercial property. The fire department retains the right to assess the stock and business property of the stores for additional protection costs, to be borne by the businesses.

A. S. Summers, chairman, A. W. Pence, and William Archer were appointed tax commissioners for two years. They were ordered to meet May 18-20 to hear tax complaints. Tax assessments will be made in April.

Mayor of St. Matthews Fears Louisville Taxes

St. Matthews Mayor James H. Noland testified yesterday that if business properties in the St. Matthews business district are annexed by Louisville they will suffer through higher taxes.

Noland was a witness in the opening of a Circuit Court trial fighting a 1946 Louisville attempt to annex a portion of the present business district. The City of St. Matthews annexed all of it in 1951.

The Mayor said that the higher Louisville tax rate would give an advantage to the businesses in the district not annexed by Louisville.

The Louisville tax rate on real estate is \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed valuation. St. Matthews' is 60 cents.

Louisville seeks to annex an area stretching along both sides of Lexington Road from Eline to Frankfort Avenue and on the south side of Frankfort from Lexington Road to Fairfax. It comprises about 44 per cent of the total business district,

Services Questioned

Noland also testified that Louisville would not get enough tax revenue from the area to pay for essential City services for perhaps as long as five years.

Another witness, Stephen A. Derry, consulting engineer and municipal expert for the City of it St. Matthews, said Louisville would not be able to give the area City services for 15 years.

Asked by Assistant City Attorney Herman Frick whether the business district would be harmed if Louisville furnished City services before 15 years, Derry answered:

"No, protessionally, but yes from a practical standpoint."

He said Louisville doesn't have the money to spend on fire protection and other services for the district and that if Leusville did spend the money he, as a city taxpayer, would object.

Louisville again has the annexation bug. Just recently we were hearing plans to annex the entire county to Louisville. When this super brain-storm exploded because of much opposition, we were given time to soothe our wounds caused by the annexation bug himself, Mayor Broaddus. Now we are facing another of our Mayor's public betterment programs, this time in the form of an annexation suit for about 44 per cent of the St. Matthews business district and the whole town of Buechel.

Buechel residents are against this move by about 500 to 4. So stated the March 1 Courier-Journal. Yet the Buechel group fighting this move must get 1.120 people out of the total number of 1.493 to appear in court in order to save themselves from annexation. It seems to me that a majority is the democratic way of life.

In St. Matthews, the facts present themselves. The St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department is an able body with three trucks at its service. The nearest Louisville fire bouse is 3½ miles from the district to be annexed. St. Matthews charges 60 cents per \$100 assessed valuation on their real-estate while at the same time Louisville charges \$1.50 per \$100. It is our recollection that you told us that all of the property in our development except a few lots on the far east end would qualify for Kentucky Inspection Bureau St. Matthews Fire Protection Area.

It has just been brought to our attention that all of the property in our development is now rated as outside any protected area; and while it appears that the development qualifies as to distance from the Fire Station and the installation of fire hydrants, we are advised that the Rating Bureau will make no move to reduce the classification for fire rating from 10th to 7th Class until they are requested to do so by certification from your Department that the necessary qualifications have been met and that your Department will answer and service alarms in our area.

Would you please advise us promptly if you will make the necessary certification to the Rating Bureau, or if there is anything we must do to expedite the accomplishment of the lower rating classification.

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2 Policemen Are Charged With Rape

St. Matthews Officers Free on \$1,000 Bail

Two City of St. Matthews policemen yesterday were charged with rape in a warrant sworn to by a 23-year-old woman.

They are Richard F. Flynn, 26, of 2329 Sycamore, and Preston L. Roberts, 27, of 1819 W. Hill. Both have been members of the St. Matthews force about two months.

Both denied the charge. They were released under \$1,000 bond each for arraignment in Quarterly Court Monday.

The woman accused the pair of raping her in an office at the St. Matthews City Hall, 131 Breckinridge Lane, early yesterday.

She, Friend Were Parked

In a signed statement taken by County police, the woman said:

She and a male friend were parked on a road in Springwood, a new subdivision near Massie Avenue and Hubbard Lane, when the two officers drove up in their car.

She told the officers she wanted to keep her friend, a married man, out of trouble, and Flynn told her, "he thought they (the officers) could get us out of the trouble we were in."

The officers then released the man, and drove the woman to City Hall. There, she said. Flynn raped her twice, and Roberts once.

Got Ride at 6 a.m.

When she resisted, she said, Flynn told her, "if I wanted to see that everything worked out all right I should co-operate..." ne

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Later, she said, Roberts took her to a hamburger stand across Taylorsville Road from Bowman Field. She got a ride home from there with a waitress about 6 a.m.

The woman and her companion of the night before went to County Police Headquarters yesterday morning where she gave her statement and took out the warrant. Her companion also gave a statement to police.

St. Matthews Police Chief R. C. Kelsay said the two officers were making "a routine patrol of a popular parking area" when the incident occurred. There have been numerous complaints of parking in the new subdivision, he said.

Officers Suspended

Kelsay said he had suspended the officers pending his own investigation. He said that both Flynn and Roberts have "expressed not only a willingness but a desire to take lie-detector tests."

After their arrest, Flynn and Roberts refused to allow a newspaper photographer to take their pictures. Nor were they photographed by County police for files, as is usual in felony cases.



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State Traffic Plan For St. Matthews

Citizens and business people have appealed to the Highway Department for relief of the traffic problem. The Highway Department has made studies and offered several plans on a number of occasions; but, in each case, every plan has been rejected either by committees from the merchants and civic clubs or from the officials of the City of St. Matthews,

PROBLEM

US 60, through St. Matthews, carrier the heaviest traffic load of any highway in the State. These one-way movements would provide a freer movement of circulating traffic and tend to eliminate congestion, it is to be expected there will be opposition to the one-way streets due to the extra distance some people will have to travel. However, field inspection shows that Massie Avenue and Ridgeway Avenue can be used, which would not make distance travelled unreasonable.

In order to induce traffic to Ridgeway, it is recommended that a shadowed left turning lang be provided at the intersection of Frankfort Avenue and Ridgeway.

The proposed plan may seem radical, however, radical measures must be taken for the existing streets to carry the traffic load,




Tar Vat Burns At Store Center

At the same time, Mr. Eline announced that the same company is developing a new residential area of 68 lots across Dutchman's Lane from the Big Springs Country Club.






Unique Method Moves 99 Phone Men To New Site

Mrs. Dorothy Bilharz, wife of a downtown Louisville businessman, was burned to death last night in the bedroom of her home, 3709 Fairway Lane, in Rolling Fields.

Her husband, Howard J. Bilharz, Sr., owner of George Moore's women's apparel shop and Davidson's millinery shop,

was burned on his legs when he tried to enter the burning bedroom. He suffered shock and was admitted to St. Joseph Infirmary.

Philip Ray Resch, a member of St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department, found Mrs. Bilharz' body on the floor at the foot of her bed, near a window. Resch and Volunteer Firemen Richard Wheeler and Paul Dawson carried the body out a window.

Chief Deputy Coroner William T. Kammerer said she died of burns over her entire body.

Dawson said the position of the body when Resch found it son's, 149 Breckinridge Lane.

indicated Mrs. Bilharz was trying to get out the window when overcome by the smoke.

Bilharz, 55, and his 49-year-old wife were the only persons in the house when the fire broke out about 9:45.

Firemen were unable to determine how the fire started.

MRS, DOROTHY BILHARZ Dies of Burns in Home Fire

Woman Dies as Flames Sweep Suburb Home; Official Probes Start

Officials probed today into the cause of a fire in a Rolling Fields home that took tfe life of a 51-year-old woman and burned her husband as he apparently tried to rescue her.

Dead is Mrs. Derothy Bilharz. Her husband is Howard J. Bilharz, Sr., 55, a downtown Louisville store owner.

Chief Deputy Coroner William T. Kammerer said it may be several days before Bilharz will be able to talk about the blaze. He is suffering from shock and from burns on his hands and face.

He said there was nothing out of the ordinary in the circumstances of the fire although its cause is a nivstery.

Officials at St. Joseph Infir-

Officials at St. Joseph Infirmary told Kammerer that Bilharz had a good night, but was so shaken by the tragedy that he would be in no condition to talk about it until tomorrow.

Two Investigations Begin

Kammerer and St. Matthews Fire Chief John Monohan are conducting separate investigations into last night's fire. The Bilharz home is at 3709 Fairway Lane, in Rolling Fields off Brownsborc Road.

/ Bilharz operates George Moore, Inc., a women's apparel shop at 630 S. Fourth, and Davidson's Millinery, 531 S. Fourth.

Kammerer said Mrs. Bilharz died of second and third-degree burns over most of her body.

Monohan said dense smoke was pouring from the bedroom of the Bilharz home when the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department arrived about 9:45 p.m.

The firemen wore gas masks to enter the house. Four lines of hose were used to confine the fire to the bedroom. The flames were soon extinguished.

Paul Dawson, a volunteer fireman, found Mrs. Bilharz's body. It was at the foot of her bed, near the window. Dawson said it appeared Mrs. Bilharz was trying to escape through the window when she was overcome by smoke.

All Furniture Charred

All the furniture in the bedroom was charred. Monohansaid there were indications the fire started under a night table. A hole was burned there through the floor.

But there was no wiring near the table and the home's heating plant was not turned on.

The home is a seven-room brick structure, all on one story. The body of Mrs. Bilharz is at

Husband Tells of Bringing Food To Room and Knocking on Door

Mrs. Dorothy Bilharz asked her husband to bring fried chicken home to her a few hours before she was found burned to death in her bedroom Monday night.

But when the husband, Howard J. Bilharz, Sr., and a business friend returned to the home after eating at a restaurant, they couldn't arouse Mrs. Bilharz in her locked bedroom. The fire was discovered about an hour later.

Bilharz, hospitalized with pneumonia and minor burns at St. Joseph Infirmary, and the friend, William Crissman of Cleveland, told this to a reporter yesterday.

Crissman said he rapped hard on Mrs. Bilharz' door about 8:40 p.m. and again about 5 minutes later, without getting a

The men figured "she didn't want it, or maybe she was sleeping," Crissman explained, so they put the chicken in the

Bilharz then went to bed in his own bedroom and Crissman

left to spend to the night at a motel.

Crissman had stayed overnight at the Bilbarz home at 3709 Fairway Lane last Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. But he said he left about 8:45 p.m. Monday so he could get an early start out of the city Tuesday morning.

Doesn't Know What Awakened Him

Billharz said he woke up and discovered the fire about 9:45 p.m. He didn't know what awakened him, he said.

Fire Strikes Century-Old Area Home

Estimate Sets Blaze Damage At \$25,000

Fire badly damaged a 100-yearold Harrods Creek home yesterday afternoon just three weeks after its new owners had finished remodeling it. Damage was estimated at \$25,000.

The house was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Koenig, Jr., Lime Kiln Lane near River Road.

The fire started about 2:15 p.m. while Mrs. Koenig was alone. She discovered it when she went to the second floor of the 14-room frame house and smelled smoke. She called neighbors, who summoned firemen.

Started on First Floor

Firemen from Harrods Creek, St. Matthews, and Lyndon volunteer fire departments fought the blaze 3 hours before bringing it under control.

Harrods Creek Fire Chief Karl Greenrose, Jr., said the blaze apparently started near a first-floor fireplace in which embers had been left smoldering. The cause was not determined.

Greenrose said the fire spread up a wall and engulfed the entire second floor. The roof of the two-story home was destroyed. The first floor also was damaged by smoke and water.

Greenrose said firemen, the Koenigs, and neighbors saved much of the furniture. Because of the damage, however, the Koenigs were not able to stay there last night. They spent the night with relatives.

Covered by Insurance

The home is owned jointly by Koenig and his two sons, Frank Koenig, III, and Charles Koenig. They are partners in a plumbing firm at 1026 S. Third.

The Koenigs bought the home last December. Charles Koenig said remodeling since then had been "extensive." Mr. and Mrs. Frank Koenig, Jr., moved in three weeks ago after remodeling was completed.

The elder Koenig estimated the damage. He said he based his estimate on fire damage only. Water and smoke damage might run the total higher than \$25,000, he said. The loss is covered by insurance, he added.

Koenig said the house had been enlarged at least three times by different owners since it was built a century ago. He said he did not know the original owner's name.

Bilharz Death Ruled Accident by Jurors

Mrs. Dorothy Bilharz was burned to death accidentally October 3 at her home, 3709 Fairway Lane, a coroner's jury held yesterday,

The jury's report did not determine the cause of the fire, which started on the floor of the bedroom in which Mrs. Bilharz was sleeping.

St. Matthews volunteer firemen told of finding her body on the floor near a window in the bedroom. They theorized she may have been overcome by smoke while trying to get out of the window.

Husband Testified

The victim's husband, Howard J. Bilharz, Sr., owner of two downtown Louisville stores, recounted to the jury his previous story of how he awakened in his own bedroom and saw smoke coming from the locked door of his wife's bedroom.

Bilharz said he attempted to get into a window before prying open the door with an ax, only to find himself forced back by a wall of fire.

St. Matthews Fire Chief John Monohan said the fire could have started from a cigarette, defective wiring, or a lamp bulb breaking.

Name Confusion Noted

Although St. Matthews firemen got to the fire promptly, the jury, in its report, recommended that zoning authorities look into the "similarity" of names of thoroughfares in Jefferson County.

Other

names similar to Fairway Lane are Fairlawn Road, Fairmeade Road, Fairmount Avenue, Fairland Avenue, Fairfield Drive, and Fairdale Road.

Such a project has been under way for more than a year, James J. Tallon, .assistant planner with the City-County Zoning Commission, has recommended several hundred changes for street names in the city and county that are confusing.

A Few Changes Made

A few changes have been made, but Tallon said, "It's going along very slowly. People would rather change the names of their children than change the names of their streets," he said.

Tallon thought the St. Matthews streets in the "Fair" group were among his proposed changes, but his list was not available yesterday.

The coroner's jury yesterday commended firemen for their "prompt and efficient action" in confining the fire to the bed-





Broaddus has promised Rolling Fields would not be annexed unless a majority of the property

owners approved.

Ordinance Passed: Louisville's Board of Alderman last Tuesday passed a long-pending ordinance proposing to annex the 172-acre subdivision. But it was emphasized that it was a move to keep alive the City's proposal, which otherwise would have died.

Louisville cannot annex the area until 30 days after passage of the ordinance, which allows property owners wishing to block annexation an opportunity to file court suits.

2. The tree should not block a door or any exits.

3. Someone in authority should inspect the tree every day to determine whether it should by left up for a longer time.

4. Be sure plenty of ashtroys are provided for smokers. Don't allow smoking near the free,

5. See that all decorations in the room have been flameproofe L

An added fire hazard exists if dresses, costumes or children's clothes made of net or gauze-like a labrics are worn. If it is impossible to avoid wearing them, they should be made flame-resistant with the following solution, Mix nine ounces of borax and four ounces of horie acid in a gallon of water. Dip the fabric in this solution, wring by hand, then hang to dry. Ironing does not affect the flame-resistance of the fabric, but the treatment most be repeated after each laundering.

A word of caution, Don't ex-pect too much from the term, "Tame-resistant," If you hold a match to flame-resistant material, it will burn. But it will not continue to burn when you take the match away. There will be no deadly or disfiguring "flash fire.

Fire Chief Urges Precautions With Christmas Trees

Chief John Monohan of the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department urges the public to take these precautions with Christmas trees:

1. Choose a small tree rather than a large one.

2. Store it outdoors until a day or two before Christmas,

3. When you bring it in, stand it in water and set it in a cool part of the house, away from radiators, heaters and fireplaces. Don't let it block an exit.

4. Be sure every lighting set and electric cord you use is in good condition - no worn or frayed wires, no loose sockets. (Natu-

rally, you never use candles!)
5. When you buy new sets or cords, look for the UL label. The ones that bear it have passed Underwriters' Laboratories tests for fire and shock hazards,

6. Provide a switch some dislance from the tree for turning

tree lights on and off,

7. Ornaments should be made of fireproof materials, like metal or glass. Never decorate with cotton or paper unless they are labelled "fireproof" or "flameproof."

8. Never set up electric trains

under the tree!

9. Don't let gift wrappings pile up under or near the tree.

10. Don't leave us home. ing when no one is home. From time to time 10. Don't leave tree lights burn-

11. From time to time, see whether needles near the lights have started to turn brown. If so, change the position of the lights.

12. When needles start to fall, take the tree down and discard it-outdoors!



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

January 1, 1956: Walser Building Fire: January 5, 1956: *The Voice Of St. Matthews*: Holiday Calls Delaying Alarm, Fire Wipes Out Walser Office, Vehicles. The first fire in St. Matthews in 1956 did a job of total destruction.

It completely wiped out the offices, a storage facilities and equipment of John A. Walser, architectural engineer and one of St. Matthews leading builders, at 4050 Westport Road.

The fire broke out just 20 minutes after the New Year had been welcomed in. Men and women, still in their New Year's party hats, came from homes in the neighborhood to watch four trucks and 32 men from the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department fight the blaze for eight hours.

Also pitching in was a truck and a crew from the Lyndon Volunteer Fire Department.

Fire Captain V. A. Beam of the St. Matthews Department reported that at least three different people fried for 15 minutes to telephone the alarm to the operator, but the lines were blocked with holiday calls.

When the firemen finally did get the alarm and were ready to work, the fire had gone so far that they could only keep it from spread-

At that, nearby garages on Ridgeway Avenue were slightly damaged. Mr. Walser put the loss at \$50,000 to \$55,000. Construction had not quite been completed on a new 41 by 105 foot frame building Mr. Walser was putting up to give him additional storage space. This was burned along with a residence he had converted to office use, and two other older buildings, one 40 by 80 feet, and the other 44 by 50 feet. Five trucks and a tractor were also burned.

Mr. Walser said his company would continue its residential building program now underway in Marydale and Beechwood Village. However, he said, the fire will slow down much of his work.

The fire started in the back part of the old building, he said. Cause was undetermined. The St. Matthews Fire Department said there was no evidence of arson.

Mr. Walser has been a builder 20 years, working out of St. Matthews since 1946. He has been at his present address since 1950. He said he could not tell now whether or not he will rebuild what the fire destroyed.

The fire came as a climax to a busy holiday season during which the St. Matthews Department answered seven fire calls, one a false alarm.

Other alarms here: December 23-residence, 403 Wendover, Mrs. J. S. Moss, in basement, flue on the furnace stopped up, out on arrival. December 25—trash fire in yard at 3704 St. Germaine, home of Allan Watts. December 26—trash fire, 3903 Warner. December 29 false alarm reported a furnace fire at 451 Macon. December 30—375 Foeburn, burning trash in yard. January 1—the Walser fire. January 3—236 Breckinridge Lane, rear, weeds in the backyard set aftire by burning trash.

Holiday Calls Delaying Alarm, Fire Wipes Out Walser Office, Vehicles

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But they were fighting a leaa start due to a delayed alarm.

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Captain V. A. Beam of the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department reported that there were 109 fire, reported to the depart-ment in 1955, plus five false alarms.

The 1954 figures were 84 calls, plus nine false alarms.

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
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January 1, 1956: Holiday Calls Delaying Alarm, Fire Wipes Out Walser Office, Vehicles. Mr. Walser was a major developer in the area. Just after midnight a major fire destroyed his operation at 4050 Westport Road. 32 firefighters fought the fire. The fire destroyed the offices, storage area and vehicles. The alarm was delayed because of the amount of holiday calls (a few minutes after midnight New Years day) prevented people from being able to call the alarm office. Damage was estimated at \$50,000 to \$55,000.00 dollars.

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
Fire Destroys Builder's Offices, Storage Space



ever, this year it will cover rented business houses, apartments, and homes.

Previously, renters of such property had to pay for their

own protection.

The Council also passed an ordinance which set maximum salaries for a chief of police, a captain, a sergeant, and patrolmen. Top pay for the chief would be \$4,800 a year; for the captain, \$4,400; for the sergeant, \$4,000; for patrolmen after six months of duty, \$3,600, and for patrolmen under six months, \$3,000.

The City has a police force of a captain and three patrolmen. Mayor James H. Noland said there was no intention of hiring a chief or sergeant or any specific number of patrolmen now.

St. Matthews' 1956 budget anticipates an increase of about \$23,000 in revenue over last year. Almost all of the increase is from property annexed last year which will become taxable this year.

The budgets lists revenue at \$102,000 compared with \$78,946 for last year. The city ended 1955 with a surplus of about \$2,000.

January 26, 1956: The Voice Of St. Matthews: Fire-Fighting Easier Now, Thinks Capt. Beam. Despite St. Matthews growth in population, the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department doesn't have to work nearly so hard as it used to, said Captain V. A. Beam.

Now 71, the upright, vigorous old fireman, the only paid man on the St. Matthews Department, said the local firemen used to have "real workouts" a good deal of the time. But now things are quieter under better control.

For one thing, he said, there are a lot less fires here than there used to be, thanks to the Fire Prevention program of recent years. Then, too, the local firemen have learned to solve there problems "the hard way."

"But training and experience" have raised the department "to the top," he said, and now, under Chief John Monohan, it is rated one of the best in the state. He reminded that the Louisville Fire Department's chief told the Local Government Improvements Committee recently that the St. Matthews Department was "very efficient—second to none."

The Captain has been an employee of the St. Matthews Fire Department since September, 1954. It seems the state retirement law caught up with him that year, and on July 1 forced him to end a 37-year career.

The St. Matthews Department hearing of this, quickly hired him. He takes care of the office from 8:30 to 4 every day, and if you call the Department during those hours, his is the voice you hear.

Though he lives at 18th and Algonquin the Captain is no stranger to the St. Matthews area. Quite the contrary. When the local fire department years ago bought its first equipment, he came out from the Louisville Fire Department, and helped train the men here.

In 1940 he was transferred to the education division of the State Fire Department, and every two or three years came out here to conduct a training school for the local firemen. And every Tuesday night he stays on out here and trains the St. Matthews firemen.

The Captain is from a distillery family. He came to Louisville when he was 20 to get away from the distillery business. He remembers his job as stock boy at Bacon's where he worked with another country boy, Andy Morris, now president-emeritus of Bacon's.

In 1917, World War I had made the Louisville Fire Department so short-handed that the firemen couldn't take time out to eat meals. The captain was asked to help for the duration, and he agreed, making the rounds of five engine companies relieving the men for meals.

When the first steam engine apparatus came along in 1913, replacing the horse-drawn fire equipment, it was discovered that Captain Beam knew something about steam engines. The Department put him on it at 20th and Madison and he says he never had a moment's trouble with it, although it had failed to operate on two or three other runs before it was given to him.

He and three buddies learned all about the new instrument, and he was brought to headquarters to break in men on the pumpers as they arrived.

So his service "for the duration" lasted 23 years, until in 1940 he went with the state.

Though vigorous in mind and body, the captain at 71 is having trouble with his eyes. This is a result of the Mengel fire at 13th and Dumesnil more than 20 years ago. He calls this fire on of the worst in Louisville's history, second only to the Hughes Lumber Co. fire.

While fighting the fire, his eyes were filled with smoke and some kind of acid which later blinded another fireman. But luckily for him, his sister-in-law was a registered nurse, and he credits her treatment of his eyes when he got home with saving his sight.

One other event in his long career stands out in the captain's mind. This was when the Louisville Fire Department had to wage a long fight in the 193_ State Legislature to keep the Department out of politics., The fireman won.

The captain is married and has three children and six grandchildren.

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City Agrees To Pay All Fire Protection Costs

Businessmen, Apartment Dwellers, Renters Will No Longer Be Billed

Businessmen in St. Matthews will no longer be billed by the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department for protection of their furnishings and office equipment.

The same goes for apartment dwellers and those renting houses here.

From now on, the City of St. Matthews will pay the whole bill for, fire protection in this community.

The City Council Tuesday authorized Mayor James Noland to sign a contract to this effect.

Under the contract the City is entirely covered for the year for a price of about \$11,337, or about \$3,000 more than last year, according to the Council. This price represents a charge of 10 cents per \$100 valuation on all property in the City.

Previous to this year, the City paid for fire protection for all buildings in St. Matthews. But the firemen sent separate hills to business firms, apartment dwellers and home renters for their furnishings and equipment.

Councilman E. R. Grinstead said this method has been unsalisfactory to the Fire Department, the City, and the people paying the extra bill.

He said the Fire Department and the City have been contracting for protection on a temporary basis for two years. The present arrangement is expected to be permanent. ground conduits. One will run under the sidewalk on the north side of Shelbyville Road from Chenoweth to St. Matthews Avenue. The other will run along the east side of Breckinridge Lane from Shelbyville Road to the easement south of Winchester.

Mr. Jones, of 3963 Olympic, has been serving as informal legal advisor for the City of Druid Hills. He is also chairman of the Brownshoro Road-U. S. 42 Protective League. A spokesman for the Fire Department said the volunteers have been "going along" with the City because of its past difficulty in collecting taxes, due to adverse ruling by the courts.

But with taxes coming insteadily, both the City and the Fire Department felt the City could bear the full weight of complete fire protection for St. Matthews.

Mayor Neland announced attorner J. W. Jones would act as special counsel for St. Matthews.

City atterney Maxwell Brown went to hall this week to serve a veer-and-a-day sentence for Pederal become tax evaluation.

Mayor Noland sald Mr. Jones was not City attorness but had been helping the City in legal motters for the nast year and a half, working with Mr. Brown. The Mayor did not say what the Council planned to do about filling the job of City attorney.

The Council hand a report from the Board of Public Works about street lights. A letter from the Louisville Gas and Electric Company was read, stating that mercury vapor lights, controlled by the sun, could be installed at six points in St. Matthews for about \$1,446.55.

The Council instructed Chet Scheihel, member of the Board of Public Works, to bring to the next meeting an estimate of onerating costs, and an exact firure as to costs of installing the six lights.

The Voice Of St. Matthews: January 31, 1957, Walser Building Nears Completion

Builder John Walser announced last week that tenants will begin to move into his new, modern building at Westport Road about February 1.

However, the building and landscaping won't be completely finished until about April 1, he said.

The two-story building, with about 16,000 square feet of floor space, plus the 180 by 200 foot lot, is valued at about \$250,000. Mr. Walser started construction after another building he owned on that site was destroyed by fire on January 1, 1956.

Mr. Walser said most of the space already has been rented out. Tweed and Tartan, a ladies' wear shop has rented the front on Westport Road, he said. All the rest is office space.

He said the upstairs already has been taken by the following: State Farm Mutual Insurance's adjusting office, Asphalt Institute of Kentucky, Tecon Engineers, the Kentucky District office of Pan Am, and realtor Harvey White.

He said the Federal Housing Administration wants to take the entire first floor and move its Louisville office there. The request to do so is now going through channels in Washington, he said, and "we should know about February 1."

The parking lot will be asphalt covered and will hold about 70 cars, he said.

The outside of the building is made of glass and porcelain panel., with aluminum windows frames and mullions. The outside colors are a pinkish orange and a colonial blue.


Mr. Walser, an architectural engineer, designed and built the building himself.



Fireman Sees Red Over Brush Fire

The face of Captain V. H. Beam, St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department, was the color of his fire truck last week. He wasn't embarrassed, but was righteously indignant.

The indignation was brought on by another "brush fire" and a malicious false alarm answered last week.

The brush fire at 217 Sherrin occurred Friday at 2:05 p.m. and was caused by the wind scattering burning rubbish. The burning rubbish was unsupervised. The false alarm was on Churchill Road.

"We've had several brush fires the past few weeks," the captain said, "and most of them could be avoided. I strongly urge the residents to keep a close eye on the trash they burn, especially during these windy months. This fire almost endangered a couple of garages on Brown Lane."

Fire Chief Urges Clean-Up For Safety, Health

Rubbish, litter and tall grass create conditions unsafe for children, Fire Chief John M. Monohan reminded local residents today as he announced the the beginning of Clean-Up Week in the St. Matthews area.

Chief Monohan expressed particular concern over vacant lots overgrown with grass and weeds and, in many instances, used as unauthorized dumping grounds.

"Places like that are apt to attract youngsters," he pointed out.
"Most children like to explore, and to poke around piles of old lumber of boxes or cans. But playing there can be dangerous. Tall grass is a fire hazard. So is rubbish — and it may also breed disease germs."

However, he added, a thorough clean-up could transform these danger spots into play areas and get the children off the streets. He expressed the hope that owners of such property would take steps to tidy it up during Clean-Up Week.

Chief Monohan concluded his reminder with a few other basic rules for children's safety, recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters:

- 1. Put matches where small children cannot reach them.
- 2. Keep children away from outdoor fires unless there is an adult present. Keep a sturdy fire seen in place whenever there is an open fire in your home.
- 3. Satisfy children's curiosity about fire by letting them help with carefully supervised jobs—blowing out matches, or helping to light a fire. But teach them the meaning of the word "hot," and show them that fire is nothing to play with.
- 4. Never leave little children at home alone!

St. Matthews and Buechel are now operating on different radio frequencies. The others will be on a third frequently until all 21 departments are radio equipped. After that, Boone said he hoped all the departments would join together on a single frequency.

Here is the plan as outlined by Boone:

Each department will have its event aid is needed. own transmitting station. fire trucks and chiefs' cars will be equipped with sending and receiving radios.

But the real core of the system will be small, portable receiving radios.

These compact units-costing \$40 to \$150 each, depending on the type, will be assigned to each volunteer. They can operate on batteries or can be plugged into a home wall socket or the cigarette lighter of a car.

How Receivers Operate

The receivers will operate only when a fire call is sent over the

Each department will have its own alarm that can be controlled by the station. Thus volunteers of one department will hear only their department's alarm. However, if Department A has a fire

ment B by punching a button on the transmitting set to include Department B's alarm.

Boone listed these advantages to the system:

With only a siren and telephones now used to notify volunteers of a fire, minutes often elapse before a fireman finds out there is a fire.

2-Eliminate the need for a fireman to go to the firehouse to find out where the fire is. The siren now tells him only that there is a fire.

3-Keep knowledge of a fire largely within the fire department. Curiosity seekers often clog roads looking for a fire now after a siren sounds.

4-Enable a department to get help from other departments quicker. Non-radio equipped departments now have to rely largely on telephones in the

To help pay for the equipment-estimated to range from \$1,000 to \$3,000 exclusive of the monitoring receivers - Fiscal Court has agreed to put up matching funds of up to \$500 for each department, Boone said.

First Plan Fell Through

The original plan to finance the radio equipment as a Civil Defense communications project through Federal matching funds fell through, Boone said, because such funds would be available only if:

1-The entire network cost over \$60,000.

2-Title to the equipment would remain with some Federal, state or County agency.

"The departments didn't want to give title to someone else," Boone said.

Boone Foresees End Of County's Fire Sirens

If Daniel B. Boone has his way, the moaning sirens atop Jefferson County's volunteer fire departments will be a thing of the past by the end of the summer.

In their place, Boone said yesterday, he foresees a highly efficient, county-wide radio network—and volunteer firemen

toting portable radio receivers everywhere they go.

The plan of Boone, co-ordinator of the county's volunteer fire departments, is viewed with something less than enthusiasm by some volunteer fire fighters.

'Quite A Long Way Off'

"In my opinion, that's quite a long way off," said John Monohan, chief of St. Matthews volunteers.

Monohan said he understands the price of a county-wide radio setup would be prohibitive—\$80,-000 at "rock bottom," he said he was told.

But Boone said the whole plan can be put into effect for about \$32,000 — without raising the present \$5-a-month fee the volunteer departments charge each homeowner for fire protection.

Sees Central Transmitter

Boone envisions an \$8,000 central transmitter—perhaps on Holsclaw Hill, in southern Jefferson County—that would send alarms and instructions to fire fighters throughout the county.

Each fireman's portable receiver could be plugged into any

The firemen would take their receivers with them everywhere—even to work, if their employers permitted,

Trip to Firehouse Avoided

Each fire department would have two-way radios in its firehouses and on its trucks, Boone said.

When a siren sounds now, the volunteers have to go to the firehouse to find out where the fire is, Boone said. Individual receivers would eliminate the need for this.

Boone said four departments—St, Matthews, Buechel, Black Mud, and Camp Taylor—now have two-way radios between fire trucks and firehouses.

Cites Fiscal Court Offer

He said Fiscal Court has voted to grant up to \$500—on a matching-fund basis—to each county volunteer department for radio equipment.

The individual departments would put up the rest of the

money, Boone said.

Ted Travelstead, president of Volunteer Fire Fighters, Inc., the volunteers' association, said his group discussed the county-wide plan but found "we just weren't getting anywhere."

He said the firemen feel they need more information about the plan.







The firemen were alerted at 7:05 p.m. when smoke was discovered rising from the marquee. A fire smoldered beneath the tarpaper roofing covering the top of the marquee where repairs had been made earlier in the day.

Apparently sparks from a welding torch used in the repair work had caused the fire. The boys worked about an hour getting to the source and putting it out. 





Appeals Court **Upholds** Annexing

Jefferson Circuit Court Judge's Adverse Decision Is Reversed

The Court of Appeals ruled yesterday that the City of Louisville can annex a large part of the St. Matthews business

The decision reversed Judge Stephen Jones of Jefferson Circuit Court. A jury in Judge Jones' court returned a verdict against annexation in March,

Louisville passed an ordinance proposing to annex the business district in 1946. A remonstrance petition was filed in Circuit Court, however, and the petition did not come to trial until last year. Meanwhile, the City of St. Matthew annexed the district in 1953

The area in question runs along both sides of Lexington from Eline Avenue east

to Shelbyville Road.

It continues east on the north side of Shelbyville Road to Chenoweth Lane and on the south side as far as Fairfax Avenue. Between Wallace and Fairfax, it dips south in jogs as far as Willis, Davies, and Grandview Avenues.

It includes the St. Matthews City Hall and Police Headquarters at 131 Breckinridge Lane.

Louisville Mayor Delighted

Louisville's Mayor Broaddus commented:

"If the decision had gone against us, I would have accepted .it. Naturally, .I'm .delighted that the decision was for us. I feel sure the Court of Appeals ruling is correct, fair, and just. I hope everybody will accept it in that spirit."

St. Matthews Mayor James H. Noland said he was not surprised by the decision, but would fight it "if recourse is available."

He noted that a "good portion" of the St. Matthews business district is not involved in the court decision.

Attorney 'Not Excited'

Wilbur O. Fields, attorney for businessmen who fought the annexation attempt, said he was 'not excited" by yesterday's rul-

ing.
Fields said that in his opinion the Mallon-plan proposal repeals the 1946 ordinance under which Louisville sought the annexa-

Therefore the outcome of the Mallon-plan vote November will determine whether th becomes annexed, Fields

district is superior to that of the City of St. Matthews.

He ruled that Judge Jones in the 1955 trial should have directed a verdict in favor of annexation. Thus the reversal was directed to the judge, rather than the jury, which included 11 Louisvillians.

Attorney Fields, commenting on this yesterday, said both sides in the case agreed at the trial that the jury would make the decision.

Finds Only Two Issues

Assistant City Attorney Frick later asked Judge Jones to grant the City a judgment despite the jury's decision, or to grant a new trial. Jones refused, and the case went to the Court of Appeals.

Commissioner Cullen, in his finding yesterday, said there were only two legal issues in the lawsuit:

1. Is addition of the new territory "for the interest of the City (of Louisville) "

2. Will annexation "cause no manifest injury to the persons holding real estate in the territory sought to be annexed?

Gives His Conclusion

Cullen found that "within the realm of clear and obvious facts, it is difficult to conceive of any situation in which the annexation of urban territory to a city would be contrary to the interests of the city, except where the an-nexation would constitute an overextension of the capacities of the city to function as a sound, going concern.

"In the case before us, there is no suggestion that Louisville not a growing, prosperous city with a long experience of growth or that its capacities will be overextended by annexation of the small area here in ques-

No 'Grievous Burden'

As to whether annexation would injure the property owners, Cullen wrote:

There is no question but that the annexed territory, bethe ing urban in nature, will te ceive benefits in the form of

A petition for rehearing the case can be made to the Court of Appeals within 30 days. If this is done, the City of Louisville has another 30 days to file an answer to the petition.

Will Await Vote

Briefs then would be submited by both sides to reach a final determination of the case. Fields said he would wait intil after the vote on the Malon plan to decide if a rehearing will be sought. The vote will determine whether a large suburban area, including St. Matthews, will be merged with Louisville.

Herman Frick, assistant City attorney who argued the City's case in last year's trial, was asked to comment on Field's opinion that the Mallon plan repeals the earlier annexation ordinance

'That's a point he will have to attempt to prove in future litigation," he said.

Louisville Steps Outlined

If and when a final judgment is handed down upholding Louisville's proposing-annexation ordinance, the City will then pass an ordinance actually annexing the area

Immediate steps then will be taken to provide City services to the area, said Mayor Broaddus and City Consultant Roy

Both Broaddus and Owsley felt the Court of Appeals decision would have a favorable effect on the Mallon-plan vote.

"It should create additional sentiment for orderly annexation, with services furnished by the City as set forth by the Mallon plan," Broaddus said.

William L. Archer, chairman of the St. Matthews Annexation Protective Association, a party to last year's suit against annexation by Louisville, called yesterday's ruling "quite a setback."

Will Fight Decision

He said it would "take the backbone out of the City of St. Matthews." He added that the business district should not be separate from the rest of the City of St. Matthews.

Archer said his group would fight the decision.

St. Matthews Mayor Noland disagreed that loss of the business area would be severe for of St. fourth-class City Matthews.

He estimated a loss of about \$22,500 in tax revenues if the area is annexed, out of a total of \$90,000 available to his City.

Louisville Claim Superior

The Court of Appeals ruling, delivered in Frankfort, was written by Commissioner Robert K. Cullen.

He held that Louisville started annexation proceedings first, annexation of the residential bence its claim to the business area.

"The real question arises from the fact that the territory is now receiving what its residents consider to be adequate municipal services, at a lower cost, from the City of St. Matthews and from a Volunteer Fire Department.

Eullen concluded, however, that annexation would not place upon the property owners any grievous, wearisome, or oppressive," burdens.

Realty Taxes Would Rise

Once annexation is completed, the Board of aldermen will be asked to appropriate money for a fire station, traffic signals, and street lights, Owsley said. Regular City services, such as street cleaning and garbage collection, would start immediately, he

Owsley said a quad fire company, which would have a fourpurpose truck, probably would be installed in the business

Meanwhile, the City would contract with the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department and perhaps reshuffle its existing equipment to provide coverage. This probably would result in an immediate drop in fire-inurance rates. Owsley said.

Real-estate taxes in the annexed area would go up from the St. Matthews 60-cent rate to \$1.50 However, no City tax bills would go out until January, 1958.

Water Rates Would Drop

Water rates would decline 33% per cent. Sewer rates would remain the same.

People who work in the annexed area and business owners in it would pay the City's 11/4 per cent occupational tax on earnings and net profits.

Six other suits involving annexation attempts by the City of Louisville may depend on the outcome of the current case. Court action has been held up pending the St. Matthews deci-








Quad No. 1 of the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department is a 1955 model with a 750-gallon-per-minute capacity.


Engine No. 1, a 1947 model, with a 750-gallon p. m. capacity.

Against the Mallon Plan

For several weeks, The Voice has been urging its readers to vote against "The Plan for Improvement," commonly called the Mallon Plan. On Tuesday, the voters will make their decisions.

Pictured above are five good reasons why the people of St. Matthews should choose to remain independent. They show what we have—not in the future—but right now, by way of police and fire protection.

The police force, of course, covers only the City of St. Matthews. But there is no reason why their services cannot be extended to other Cities who want them . The St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department, with four good trucks and a force of more than 50 men, including a quad company, is already protecting St. Matthews, Brownsboro Village, Druid Hills, Bellewood, Cherrywood, Beechwood Village, Norbourne Estates, Springlee, Plymouth Village, Richlawn, Windy Hills, Parkside, Fairmeade, and surrounding areas.

How good are they? The company has been in operation for 43 years. The men undergo thorough, professional training. No less an authority than the Chief of the Louisville Fire Department on a television program asserted that the St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department was "second to none." And these volunteers work for free.

The Mallon Committee has been very frank in admitting that annexation would cost suburban residents more money. But one item has slipped their notice, It was a statement by the president of the Louisville Board of Aldermen in the Red Flash edition of the June 20 Louisville Times, Louisville has got to get rid of its "Caspar Milquetoast" tax program, he said, and added, "We have got to get bolder and add to our revenue." The only way to add to taxes is to levy them against Louisville residents, and if the Mallon Plan is carried, we in the suburbs will be Louisville residents.





Using two trucks the volunteers spent over an hour fighting the fire and keeping it isolated from the rest of the house. Mrs. Bullitt reported the fire from a neighbors house when flames cut her

Death by fire in the home is one of the commonest yet most avoidable of all family tragedies, says the National Fire Protection Association, During Fire Prevention Week, the NFPA urges all members of the family to take preventative measures against these main causes of home fires:

- 1. Careless smoking and handling of matches. Put out ciga-reltes and matches carefully. Keep matches away from chiltiren.
- 2. Defective chimneys and heating plants shoot out danger-ous sparks. A clean chimney and a fire-resistant roofing material such as asphalt shingles is the best way to protect the home from chimney sparks or from trash fires.
- 3. Overloaded or defective wiring circuits. Only a qualified electrician should install wiring.
